4	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Good morning,
5	everyone. This is Robert Rivera. This is the meeting
6	of the Texas Lottery Commission called now to order.
7	Today is December 3rd, the time is 10:00 a.m. First,
8	we're going to do a roll call of the Commissioners.
9	Start with Commissioner Fields. Commissioner Franz
10	are you there, Fields?

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comment requests were due by 5:00 p.m. yesterday. For the benefit of the audience and our court reporter, we will ask every speaker to state their name before they speak.

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Before we start I want to let everybody know -- everyone know that since our last meeting Governor Abbott designated Commissioner Fields as our Bingo Commissioner. The Bingo Commissioner is a position that is required by our governing statute and this announcement is great news for the bingo program and the Texas bingo industry.

Commissioner Fields brings a wealth of experience in business and state government that -- and we thank her for her willingness to serve in this important position.

Commissioner Fields, do you -- do you have a few words so far in your few weeks in?

COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Yeah. I've already started working with Tom and it's been a real pleasure. I'm glad to serve in this capacity. And I think we can -- we can do some good things with Charitable Bingo. So, I'm glad to -- glad to be here.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Wonderful. Well, I know that you've hit the ground running and I've heard from lots of folks regarding your involvement in the

action items ahead that we'll in part discuss later in this meeting. So, I thank you for your commitment to Texas bingo.

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# AGENDA ITEM NO. II

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. The first item is the biennial security study of the lottery. Mike, this is your item.

MR. FERNANDEZ: Good morning Mr.

Chairman, Commissioners. For the record my name is

Mike Fernandez and I'm the Director of Administration.

Item 2 in your notebook is a presentation of the 2020 Biennial Security Study of the Texas Lottery Commission. Government Code 466.020 requires the Executive Director at least once every two years to employ an independent firm to conduct a comprehensive security study of all aspects of Lottery security, stipulating the 12 specific areas that must be reviewed.

The Act further requires copies of the study be provided to the Commission, the Governor, and Legislature. A copy of the public report will be placed on the agency website and the appropriate offices notified of its availability.

The 2020 Security Study was conducted by BerryDunn. With me this morning is Christopher

Ellingwood, Senior Manager, Information Technology
Assurance, to present the study. I will now turn it
over to Chris. Chris, it's yours.

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MR. ELLINGWOOD: Great. Thank you,
Mike. Good morning everyone. As Mike said, my name is
Christopher Ellingwood. I am a senior manager at our
Information Technology and Lottery Services group at
BerryDunn. I'd like to just talk briefly on the
process for which we've conducted the security study,
introduce you to just a little background of the firm,
and present some very high-level results of the
security study.

Now, BerryDunn is headquartered out in Portland, Maine. And my team and my group specializes in lottery services. On a given year we're providing approximately 30 audits to state lottery agencies and their vendors around security and internal controls. We also work with lotteries all over the United States, Carribean, Canada, and Europe.

We have worked with new lotteries and new systems, including digital, sportsbook, and we have a wide gamut and view into emerging products throughout the industry. And this is our third time working with the Texas Lottery on the security study. And we have been working in the industry since 1995. I have a

dedicated team of about eight people who work full-time in the lottery with me.

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We want to really thank Mike Fernandez, Eric Williams, Joan Kotal, and Jason Cannaday for helping us through the security study.

As you know with COVID, things are a little different this year. And we started our security study on site at the Texas Lottery offices, and that was actually our last business trip of 2020 before we were grounded from the pandemic. We were very fortunate that working with the Texas Lottery personnel, the flexibility given to us and the willingness and effort of everyone who works at the Lottery to get us the information, spend a little extra time on Microsoft Teams meetings, sharing screens, running the computer, and showing us things that normally would be a lot more efficient done in person, but we got through it.

This year, as always, our security study consists of three phases: a planning phase, a risk phase, and the assessment phase. As I mentioned, this is our third year doing the security study for the Texas Lottery, and we want to comment on the success of the investment they have made over past recommendations. And we've noted a lot of new

technology, new system upgrades, and a new focus for IT security that was put in place.

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So, with that, we spent our first part of our phasing -- planning phase, understanding the new changes that were made and some of the new products, especially around the installation of the in-lane system, the in-lane sales system, and the QUICKTICKETs.

Me interviewed approximately 22 managers, and high-level personnel throughout nearly every department of the Lottery and we identified about 169 risks which are based on best practice and current procedures within the Lottery. From those 169 risks and through our meetings, we identified 199 internal controls that are in place throughout the agency to mitigate those risks.

And we provided the Texas Lottery with a detailed report that broke down all of the risks and what those results were. This also included an assessment of vendors, including IGT and other new vendors that were put in place throughout the last two years.

The second phase is that we came in and we tested those 199 controls for the operating effectiveness throughout the two-year period since when the last security study was performed. We tested this

through inspection of documents, sampling, interviews, and observation of system configurations. While we were doing this, we were also looking for opportunities based on our industry experience on controls that were happening, processes, and seeking opportunities for improvement and best practices.

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At the result of our report, we did have one finding noted around internal controls where one control was not performed, and it is my understanding that's been addressed.

We also provided the Lottery with 10 best practice recommendations: 7 were moderate risk, 3 were low risk. None of the risk or findings would impact the security or the integrity of any of the games, systems or products within the Texas Lottery as also noted.

A lot of our recommendations and best practices were focused around some of the new systems that were put in place, virtualization of computing systems, and some third-party management as new products are introduced to the Lottery.

That is all I have to present to you.

Any questions or anything else, please let me know.

And again, thank you everyone at the Lottery for their help. It was a wonderful experience, and unique for

all of us, and we got through it with the COVID pandemic.

## AGENDA ITEM NO. III

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is the 2020 demographic report on lottery players. Ryan, this is your item.

MR. MINDELL: Good morning. For the record, Chairman and Commissioners, my name is Ryan Mindell, the Director of Lottery Operations.

As you know, Section 466.021 of the State Lottery Act requires the executive director to conduct a demographic study of Texas Lottery players every two years. The results of the study must be presented to the Commission, the Governor, and the Legislature prior to each legislative session.

Demographic Study. Here today is Dr. Gail Buttorff,
Co-Director of the Survey Research Institute at the
University of Houston's Hobby School of Public Affairs
and she will present to you the results of the
demographic study. With that, I'll turn it over to Dr.
Buttorff.

Good morning, and thank DR. BUTTORFF: 1 2 you for having me. As Ryan mentioned, my name is Gail 3 Buttorff from the Hobby School of Public Affairs. I'm also joined by Dr. Jim Granato who is the Associate 4 5 Dean of the Hobby School at the University of Houston. 6 We're here today to present the results 7 of the 2020 Demographic Survey of Texas Lottery 8 The next slide, please. Players. 9 And while they are working on the 10

And while they are working on the slides, I can just go ahead and get started. The survey was conducted between August 24th and September 15th, 2020. We had a sample size of 1,687.

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We conducted this survey by both phone and online. So the distribution was 64 percent of respondents were contacted via phone, and 36 percent of respondents were contacted online.

The margin of error for the survey was plus or minus 2.4 percent, and that's at a 95 percent confidence level. Okay. Next slide, please.

Okay. So compared to 2018, we saw about a 3.2 percentage points increase in the participation rate. So among all respondents, 45.2 percent reported playing the Texas Lottery at some point during the past year.

In terms of demographic differences

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between players and non-players amongst survey respondents, we found statistically significant differences for those characteristics including income, employment status, whether a respondent owns or rents their home, whether they have children under 18 living in the household, gender, and Hispanic origin.

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In terms of amounts spent, we saw an increase over the past few years from \$13 -- and this is the median dollars spent -- \$13 in 2016, \$25 in 2018, and finally in 2020 we had \$36 in terms of the median amount spent. Next slide, please.

In terms of participation rates by lottery sales districts, the highest participation rates were in McAllen, Waco, and Houston East. And McAllen had a participation rate of 58.6, Waco of 52.8, and Houston East of 52.7. The lowest sales districts by participation rate were Tyler, Fort Worth, and Houston West.

The highest average expenditure per month was in El Paso, and that average was \$82.93 per month. And the highest median expenditure per month was in the McAllen sales district with \$56 per month on average. Next slide, please.

Okay. In terms of which games were -- had the highest participation rate, Lotto Texas

remained the most popular by far with 74 percent of respondents saying they played it at least once in the last year. This was followed by Scratch, with a participation rate of 70.4 percent, Pick 3 with 60.7 percent participation rate, Mega Millions with a participation rate of 56.8, and Powerball with a participation rate of 51 percent.

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In terms of highest average expenditure per play, this was for the Fireball feature with Pick 3 and that average expenditure was \$24.82 per play.

The game and feature with the highest average number of times played was Fireball feature with Daily 4, and this had an average of 2.79 times per week played among respondents. And, finally, Daily 4 was played -- had the highest average play per month at 5.17 times per month. Next slide, please.

Okay. And as for the average number of times played, whether weekly, monthly, or annually, compared to 2018, we saw stable participation for Lotto Texas -- or stable or increases for Lotto Texas, Mega Millions, All or Nothing. Scratch was stable or down for the number of times played weekly, monthly, or annually. And we had mixed results for Powerball, Pick 3, Cash 5, Megaplier, and the others listed there.

In terms of average dollars spent per

play, the games that were either stable or had increases compared to 2018 were Lotto Texas, Scratch, Mega Millions, Powerball, Pick 3, Cash 5, Megaplier, Power Play, Extra, Texas Two Step, All or Nothing, and finally Daily 4. Next slide, please.

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Okay. This figure shows the participation rate over the last 27 years. So, you know, from the mid '90s we've seen a decrease in the participation rate of Texas Lottery, however, over the past, you know, five or six years it has been steadily increasing. And from 25 percent in 2014 to now in 2020 we have a participation rate of 45.2 percent. Next slide, please.

And this table highlights participation rates and some key changes for the games and features. Though, as mentioned earlier, Lotto Texas had the highest participation rate in 2020 with about 75 percent of players having played it at least once during the last year.

In terms of changes in participation rate from 2018 to 2020, Powerball saw the largest decrease. It had a decrease in its participation rate of 5.4 percent. And Pick 3 saw the highest increase in its participation rate with 19 percent increase from the participation rate in 2018.

In terms of frequency of purchase, as 1 2 noted earlier, Daily 4 had high frequency of purchase 3 and for both at least one -- so for both weekly and monthly. And the average number of times played per 4 5 week and per month, as noted previously, were for Daily 6 4 and the Fireball feature with Daily 4. So, that was 7 2.79 on average per week and about 5 times per month 8 for Daily 4. 9 And again, the highest average amount 10 spent per player was for Fireball feature with Pick 3, 11 at about \$25. Next slide, please.

> And that's all we have today, and we're happy to answer any questions that anyone may have about the presentation or results contained in the report. Thank you.

19	Item 6 in your notebooks contains a
20	proposal to amend three rules: Rule 401.305, the Lotto
21	Texas Draw Game Rule; Rule 401.312, the Texas Two Step
22	Draw Game Rule; and Rule 401.317, the Powerball Draw
23	Game Rule. Specifically, the proposed amendments to
24	the Lotto Texas Draw Game Rule and the Texas Two Step

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Draw Game Rule provide that the drawings for those

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games will occur on days and times specified by the

Commission's executive director, which may be days and

times other than the rules currently provide.

And the amendment for the Powerball Draw

Game Rule provides that Powerball drawings will occur

on the days specified by the Multi-State Lottery

on the days specified by the Multi-State Lottery

Association Powerball Group and announced by the

executive director, which also may be days other than

the rule currently provides.

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The purpose of these proposed amendments is to provide the Commission greater flexibility to coordinate the draw dates and times for its jackpot draw games to maximize potential revenue to the state.

So, staff recommends the Commission initiate the rulemaking process by publishing these proposed amendments in the Texas Register to receive public comment for a period of 30 days. And if you have any questions, I'll be happy to answer them. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Kyle, thank you so much. Commissioners, any discussion? Okay. Is there a motion to publish the proposal for public comment?

COMMISSIONER STEEN: This is Jamey. So moved.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: All righty. A second?

COMMISSIONER FIELDS: I'll second. 1 2 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Wonderful. All in 3 favor say aye. (Chorus of "ayes") 4 5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Perfect. Okay. 6 Trace, are you there? 7 AGENDA ITEM NO. VII 8 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Let's move on 9 then to item number seven which is a report on lottery 10 sales and revenue. We got Kathy and Robert. 11 MS. PYKA: Good morning, Commissioners. 12 And we'll give our IT team a few seconds to get the 1.3 PowerPoint loaded. There we are. My name is Kathy 14 Pyka, Controller for the agency. With me presenting 1.5 this morning is the Commission's Products Manager 16 Robert Tirloni. 17 Our presentation this morning will begin 18 with the data on slide 2. Comparative sales through 19 the week ending November 28, 2020 are presented at the 20 bottom of this slide. Total Fiscal Year 2021 sales 21 through this 13-week period are \$1,740,000,000, an 22 increase of \$303,000,000, or 21 percent over the 23 \$1,440,000,000 the same period last fiscal year. 24 Fiscal Year 2020 Scratch ticket sales

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reflected on the second orange bar are \$1,443,000,000,

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which is a \$270-million increase over the sales figure for Fiscal Year 2020. With a growth rate of 23 percent over last fiscal year the Commission has continued to report double-digit increases over Fiscal Year 2020 sales.

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We have now had 33 consecutive weeks of Scratch ticket sales over \$100-million beginning with the week ending April 17th of last fiscal year.

Scratch ticket sales amount to 82.8 percent of total sales through this period as compared to 81 1/2 percent last fiscal year.

Fiscal Year 2021 Draw sales, reflected on the second blue bar, are \$300-million which is a \$33-million increase, or 12.4 percent, over the \$266.9-million reported for last fiscal year. With the exception of Mega Millions, every draw game is reporting year-over-year increases this fiscal year.

Robert will now provide an overview of detailed sales as outlined on slide 3.

MR. TIRLONI: Thanks, Kathy. Good morning Mr. Chairman and Commissioners. This next slide is a comparison of Fiscal 2021 to last fiscal, Fiscal Year '20, and it's through last Saturday, November 28th.

We can start at the top of the slide

with the Jackpot games in the white font. Our Jackpot games are up just over \$20-million year-over-year. The majority of that gain is actually coming from our instate game, Lotto Texas, our big in-state game. Lotto Texas is up 14.4-million, and its add-on feature, Extra, is up 4.7-million.

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So, we're seeing a nice \$19-million gain from Lotto and its add-on. That's because of the Lotto jackpot that began rolling last fiscal year and it continued to roll all the way into the beginning of this fiscal year. And it ended up with a \$47-million advertised jackpot in early September. So, that's the -- that's a pretty high jackpot for our in-state game. So, that's the reason for that gain there.

Mega Millions is down slightly. This time last year Mega Millions had climbed up to \$243-million, and we are just now getting up to that level. The current jackpot is \$244-million for tomorrow night for Mega Millions. So, you know, if we can keep that game rolling we should be able to make up some of that deficit, so we'll have to see what happens there.

Powerball and its associated add-on game, Power Play, are up about \$4.9-million. So, really the gain from Powerball and the loss from Mega Millions are kind of netting out to zero.

Different situation with Powerball. The highest the jackpot got this time last year was about \$150-million, and now we're at \$243-million for Saturday's drawing. So, that's the reason for that gain, and we certainly hope to see that gain increase. And our smaller in-state jackpot game, Texas Two Step, is doing well. It's up \$1-million.

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Continuing down into the middle of the slide, we're getting some great results from our daily games. The daily games are up \$12.8-million, with the majority of that gain coming from Pick 3 with its addon, Fireball. We've got an \$8.6-million gain from those products. Daily 4 with the same add-on feature, Fireball, is also doing well with a \$2-million gain.

And we are seeing some slight gains from Cash 5 and All or Nothing.

So our draw games as a whole are up \$33-million year-over-year.

Continued great scratch ticket performance. We're at just about \$1.44-billion for the year. And that's giving us a \$270-million gain for the Scratch portion of the portfolio. And so, all told, we're realizing a \$303-million gain for the entire portfolio. We can move to the next slide.

Commissioners, I wanted to provide you

with a brief update today on our contributions to Texas veterans. Specifically, the Fund for Veterans
Assistance, which benefits more than 1.5-million veterans in the State of Texas. To date the Texas
Lottery has generated more than \$144-million for Texas
Veterans since our first game was launched in the fall of 2009. And this total includes our record-breaking contribution of \$22.2-million in Fiscal Year 2020, which was last year.

On November 7th, Commissioner Franz
represented the agency during a pre-recorded
presentation, which was shown during half-time at the
University of Texas Longhorn football game where he
presented representatives of the Texas Veterans
Commission with a ceremonial check reflecting our total
contributions to the Fund for Veterans Assistance. And
we wanted to share the video of this presentation with
you today.

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So, Commissioners, that was a great presentation and a presentation in that setting certainly calls attention to our efforts to help support Texas veterans. And, so, we're glad to be able to show that to you today.

And that concludes the sales

presentation. Kathy or I would be happy to answer any questions that you may have.

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Wonderful

presentation, as always. Wonderful video. It was

really nice to see and nice to see smiling faces there

not having to wear the mask for even just a few

minutes. That definitely brightens up, I'm sure, all

of our days. Any comments from Commissioners?

Okay. None? Wow. We will then move

on.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Let's see here. Let's go back and see if we have Trace available. Okay.

We'll just move into the final item, then. Next item, number 8, a report on transfers to the state and the agency budget status. Kathy, also your item.

MS. PYKA: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The report in your notebook reflects accrued revenue transfers and allocations to the Foundation School Fund and Texas Veterans Commission, as well as the allocation of unclaimed prizes for the two-month period ending October 30, 2020.

Total accrued revenue transfers to the state amounted to \$244-million for the first two months of Fiscal Year 2021. Of the \$244-million transfer to

the state, \$240.9-million was the amount of revenue transferred to the Foundation School Fund, and \$3.2-million was the amount transferred to the Texas Veterans Commission.

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This leaves us with a 22.6 percent, or \$44.4-million increase of revenue to the Foundation School Fund for the same period last fiscal year.

Total cumulative transfers to the Foundation School Fund through October of this year amounted to \$25.95-billion.

Also included in your notebook is the agency's final Fiscal Year 2020 Method of Financing Summary for the fiscal year ending August 31, 2020. The Commission's lottery account budget for Fiscal Year 2020 was \$274.8-million. Of this amount 81 percent was expended and encumbered through the end of the fiscal year.

The Bingo administration budget funded by General Revenue was \$6.25-million with 88.1 percent expended and encumbered through the end of the fiscal year.

Commissioners, this concludes my presentation, and I'd be happy to answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Commissioners, any discussion? Okay. Kathy, good job. Thank you.

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# AGENDA ITEM NO. IX

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item is a report from Darlene Brown. Your item.

MS. BROWN: Good morning, Chairman and Commissioners. For the record my name is Darlene Brown, and I'm the internal auditor for the agency.

In your materials are two reports. The first report is in the Charitable Bingo Operations

Division's regulatory enforcement process performed within the Compliance Department. Our audit focused on the processes and internal controls in place used by staff to identify, track, and monitor instances of regulatory non-compliance noted through bingo audits, inspections, desk reviews, and compliance received.

We noted that the Compliance Department had not been performing several of the monitoring and tracking activities assigned to them, and therefore we rated the internal controls as "major improvement needed".

We provided recommendations to improve the internal controls and processes within the compliance function. The Bingo director immediately started addressing the findings when we brought them to his attention. Did not wait until the final report was

issued, so we give him compliments for that, and we expect that our findings will be fully remediated within six months.

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We've also been following up on prior audit findings within the Charitable Bingo Operations Division. The first item is written procedures across the functions within the division. They are currently in progress, and significant progress has been made.

The audit processes have been modified and completed and they were recently updated to reflect the new operating environment resulting from the pandemic.

Staffing some of the positions have been filled where they have been allowed to fill them. The auditor positions, the align -- re-alignment is still going on, and job postings are in progress. And there has been some more employee turnover which places a shortage in the division and additional workload burdens on remaining staff.

Finally, the ledger account reconciliation project has not started. The individual that was brought on to assist with that project has been pulled into daily operations due to staffing shortages and has not been able to address that activity yet.

If you have any questions on the reports 1 2 for Bingo operations, I'll be happy to answer them. 3 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Commissioners, any discussion? Okay. Darlene, thank you so much. 4 5 MS. BROWN: The second -- I have one 6 more report. 7 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. MS. BROWN: And the second one's much 8 It's the agency's warehouse operations. We 9 shorter. 10 noted that the agency has sound processes and strong 11 internal controls in place to ensure that warehouse 12 operations protect the agency's assets, secure the 1.3 facility, and provide a safe work environment for 14 employees and visitors. We had no findings and we 1.5 rated the internal controls of it as effective. 16 And that is the end of my reports today. 17 And I'm happy to address any questions. 18 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Very nice. 19 Commissioners, any comments? 20 MR. SMITH: Hello? 21 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Someone has a comment? 22 MR. SMITH: Hello? This is -- sorry, 23 We finally got the microphone working. sir. 24 Trace.

I'm confident you 1.3 will have something to weigh in regarding Trace's 14 report potentially and then look forward to hearing 1.5 from Commissioner Fields as well. Tom. HANSON: 18 Commissioners, for the record my name is Tom Hanson, 19 Director of the Charitable Bingo Operations Division. 20 On behalf of Trace Smith my 21 understanding is he had, basically, three items to 22 discuss. One was that they are nominating Corey Harris 23 as the ninth member of the Bingo Advisory Committee. 24 background investigation has been completed.

were no findings. But it will require a vote of the

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Commission to appoint him to that position.

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The second item on the list was, as he stated, his appreciation for the fact that the Governor's Office has appointed, and Commissioner Fields was nice enough to accept that position, as the designated Bingo Commissioner.

I was fortunate enough to introduce her to the group at the last Bingo Advisory Committee meeting. She was warmly received by the industry.

The third item, the BAC and the industry has reported that unlawful bingo being conducted via Facebook is having a detrimental effect on the potential proceeds used by licensed organizations in support of their charitable purposes.

They asked for agency action of some kind to assist them. In response to that request for agency assistance, the agency developed an action plan which included the creation of advisory letters which will be directed to Facebook, bingo licensees, the Attorney General's Office, and the Association of Texas District and County Attorneys. They will also be posted on the Bingo Division website.

This is in addition to accepting and investigating complaints received by the agency.

Additionally, you received copies of the

Bingo Compliance Audit completed by our internal auditor. As noted in the management responses, we concur with the findings and recommendations and initiated changes to address the issues. This included developing procedures to define the compliance activity along with direct conversations with the Compliance Department coordinator related to the duties and responsibilities of that position.

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We are moving forward in addressing each of the recommendations and plan to come before the Commission with updates until we have addressed all of the noted issues. We are also in a in the process of filling a vacancy in the Compliance Department.

One other item, Commissioners, as mentioned by Darlene Brown. Staff that was brought in to conduct the business process evaluation and restructuring along with the ledger reconciliation got deeply involved in the day-to-day Accounting Department activity due to staff shortages and was unable to complete the ledger reconciliation.

I'll be glad to answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Tom. Thank you so much for your report and having to come in and do double duty there regarding Trace's absence. And if you could also please pass along to him our collective

appreciation for his work and effort for Texas bingo.

And we look forward to visiting with him on a future

Zoom meeting and/or, you know, God willing as soon as
possible in person at a future meeting would be great.

Commissioner Fields --

MR. HANSON: I will do so.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank you, Tom.

Commissioner Fields, any thoughts?

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commissioner fields: Sure. We've been going over with Tom the responses to the compliance audit and he and his folks there were going to -- they're working really hard on getting everything back up to speed. The accountants tend to look at this stuff, we call it areas for opportunities for improvement.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Yes.

COMMISSIONER FIELDS: So, that's what we've got here and it'll be worked on. We've got the action steps that are going to be taken with respect to the illegal bingo games. And it looks like the actions are good. I've looked at the letters that are going to go out, and they look good to go. So, we'll get all that done very quickly. And hopefully it'll have some effect. Law enforcement is the ultimate party that needs to be involved in this. Because we don't really

1	have much ability to do anything about it. But we'll
2	do our best.
3	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Perfect. Well
4	COMMISSIONER FIELDS: That's all I've
5	got.

GRIEF: Thank you, Commissioners. 12 For the record, this is Gary Grief, executive director. 1.3 And, Commissioners, in addition to 14 what's in your notebook today I have two brief items to 1.5 share with you. 16 First, on this Sunday, December 6th, we will be launching an updated agency website. 17 18 much-needed refresh is going to feature a simplified, 19 more mobile-friendly design. And of course all the 20 information and resources that the public has come to 21 rely on will still be present. 22 This initiative was an agency-wide 23 effort, with staff from many various departments 24 participating to help us develop a logical, user-

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focused website design and there were many hours spent

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testing the new site to ensure that this is going to be
a seamless transition this weekend.

And second, as you know, the legislative
session is scheduled to convene on January 12th. While

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session is scheduled to convene on January 12th. While the state capitol currently remains closed to the public, our state leadership along with members of the House and Senate are discussing how the state's business during this session will be conducted.

Our agency's Governmental Affairs team is closely monitoring what the capital landscape is going to be like during the session and they are also busy reviewing bills that have already been filed and our Governmental Affairs Director Nelda Treviño will continue to provide you with updates as the legislative session nears and throughout the session.

Mr. Chairman, that concludes my report.

I will be happy to answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Gary, thank you so much, as always, for your continued just absolute leadership on everything there in the building. So we are grateful. Commissioners, any comments? Questions?

AGENDA ITEM NO. XII

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. We will move on then. Item number 12. Bob. Your item.

MR. BIARD: Thank you, Chairman. For

the record, I'm Bob Biard, General Counsel.

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Commissioners, item 12 contains five lottery and bingo enforcement matters, tabs A through E in your notebook. In these cases Commission staff either found a licensee violated a statute or rule, or an applicant did not qualify for a license. In many cases either the respondent failed to appear at the hearing and it proceeds by default, or the staff and the respondent reached a settlement in the form of an agreed order. Occasionally we have litigated cases, as we do have one today.

Tabs A through C are the non-sufficient fund Lottery retailer license revocations handled in a single order. Each case was presented at the State Office of Administrative Hearings for revocation of the retailer license because the licensee failed to have sufficient funds in their bank account to cover electronic fund transfers to the Commission's account. In each case, the licensee failed to appear and the judge remanded the case to the Commission to handle.

Tab D is a motion for rehearing filed by a Lottery retailer whose two licenses you revoked at the last Commission meeting. The retailer raised no new issues of fact or law that were not previously considered by the Commission, and the staff recommends

denying the motion.

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This was a retailer who repeatedly violated the rules of a retailer cash incentive program to make it appear he was selling tickets he was not actually offering for sale. And he disregarded our repeated warnings to follow the rules. So, we recommend denying that motion for rehearing.

The final item is Tab E. It's a Bingo Agreed Order. There were two conductor organizations who repeatedly ignored our Bingo staff auditor's request for information to conduct an audit. This happened about 10 or more times and rather than go to a hearing, the organizations each agreed to pay a \$2500 penalty, and the staff recommends you approve this agreed order.

That concludes my presentation, and you may take up the enforcement orders in a single vote if you like. I'll be happy to answer any questions.

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we discussed earlier when Tom gave his presentation about the Charitable Bingo operations, the ledger has not been reconciled and needs to be reconciled. And I would like to request that we ask our internal auditor to assist the Bingo Division to reconcile the ledger. And hopefully Darlene is on the call. If she is, Darlene, can you tell us if you have the capacity to do that?

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MS. BROWN: Yes. This is Darlene Brown, the Internal Auditor. We definitely have the capacity to do that. And we also have significant budget remaining in our Fiscal Year 2021 internal audit budget to be able to handle that without any additional cost to the agency.

What we would need to do is bring back to you a revised Internal Audit Plan for the next Commission meeting, but we can proceed completing or beginning the ledger reconciliation project before then.

COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Excellent. Than I would like to make a motion that Darlene -- that we hire Darlene's firm to do that and that she does come back with the revised audit plan to include this activity.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Wonderful comments and

recommendation by our esteemed Bingo Commissioner. Do we have a second?

COMMISSIONER SAENZ: This is Erik, I second.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: All right. All in favor say aye.
