4	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Good morning,
5	everyone. This is Robert Rivera and this is the
6	meeting of the Texas Lottery Commission called to
7	order. Today is February the 11th at 10:00 am. First
8	we will do a roll call for our Lottery Commissioners.
9	Commissioner Fields.
10	COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Here.
11	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Commissioner Saenz.
12	Commissioner Franz.
13	COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Here.
14	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Commissioner Steen.
15	COMMISSIONER STEEN: Here.
16	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: I will go again.
17	Erik. Commissioner Saenz. (No response) Okay. We do
18	have a quorum, so we are moving forward.
19	This meeting is being conducted on Zoom
20	pursuant to Governor Abbot's temporary suspension of
21	certain open meeting laws during the COVID-19 disaster
22	declaration. For the benefit of the audience and our
23	court reporter, we ask everyone to state their name
24	before they speak.

For those of you who did not join our

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Commission meeting last week, we have a new Acting Bingo Director, Tyler Vance. Tyler, we are glad that you are with us in your new position.

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## AGENDA ITEM NO. II

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: So, the first item is our annual financial audit. Kathy, this is your item.

MS. PYKA: Good morning, Commissioners.

My name is Kathy Pyka, controller for the agency. With

me this morning is Kevin Sanford, the Engagement

Partner from the firm Weaver and Tidwell who performed

our required annual financial audit.

Kevin, I will allow you to proceed with an overview of our audited results.

MR. SANFORD: Thank you, Kathy. Kevin Sanford, partner with the external audit firm of Weaver and Tidwell. Good morning, Chairman and Commissioners. Thank you for having me here today. It's my pleasure to be here to present the results of our audit of the Texas Lottery Commission's financial statements for the year ended August 31st, 2020.

I believe you all have an electronic copy of the document, and possibly a printed copy, so I'll refer to a few page numbers out of each as I have my prepared comments. And I'm intentionally keeping these brief in the interest of time, as well as to

allow some time if you do have any detailed questions to have those presented.

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Feel free to interrupt me, though, during comments. No need to wait till the end if you do have something that you'd like me to go into more detail on as I go through the document.

So, I'll start with our opinion on the Commission's financial statements, which is on printed page 4 or PDF page 6 of the document. Our report this year, once again, actually at the top of the next page, page 5 or page 7, is an unmodified, or a clean opinion, that is the highest level of assurance that independent auditors can give to a set of financial statements.

And it states that in all material aspects, the Commission's financial statements are materially correct.

The main financial statement for the Lottery Commission is on page 31 of the PDF, or page 29 in the printed document. And this is the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position for the Lottery Fund. And starting at the top of that page, the ticket sales for the year ended August 31, 2020 were just over \$6.7-billion, which is a 7.2 percent increase from the prior year about 6-million -- or, I'm sorry, 6,250,000,000.

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The total operating expenses were 6,714,000,000, of which about two-thirds, almost exactly two-thirds, of that represents prizes from the ticket sales, 4,442,000,000, as well as 1,683,000,000 transfers to other state agencies, primarily the Foundation School Fund, which is 1.66-billion of that 1.68-billion.

So, the operating loss for the year was just under \$8.7-million, which was offset by an increase in fair value of the Commission's investments of about 11.77-million. So, the change in net position was a positive change of \$3,083,000 for the year-end at, again, August 31st, 2020.

Behind that is the Cash Flows for the Lottery Fund, as well as the footnotes for the year. There's quite a bit more detail and supporting information in those footnotes that support the balances in the financial statements. I was not going to go through those in detail. They're largely the same as the prior year. There were no material new accounting and auditing pronouncements that impacted the Commission's financial statements for the year, so it's largely just updating the balances for the current year activity.

And then the final item that I was going

to highlight in our report is our opinion under

Government Auditing Standards. Of course, the Lottery,

as a state agency of the State of Texas, we have to

conduct our audit in accordance with Government

Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of

the United States, which requires us to do some testing

of internal controls over financial reporting, as well

as other key items for compliance and other matters.

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And in accordance with Government

Auditing Standards, if we do have any deficiencies in
internal control that rise to either be a significant
deficiency or a material weakness, or we have any
material compliance findings in our testing, we are
required to report those in this report and bring them
to your attention.

I'm very happy to report that we did not have either of those. So, no significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal controls, as well as no compliance findings in our testing. So, that report also is a clean report.

And the final item I'll say is, I believe you also have an electronic copy of what's known as the Governance Letter. In accordance with audit standards, we are required to communicate certain items to you as the Commission, as the body responsible

1	for the oversight of our audit. And I'm happy to
2	report in there that there is nothing other than really
3	the standard audit communications in there. So, again,
4	I wasn't going to go through those in detail. I would
5	certainly point out if there was anything out of the
6	ordinary in that letter, and there is not in this
7	current year.
8	So, with that, that concludes my kind of
9	prepared comments. But if there's any other items you
10	would like me to go through in more detail or have any
11	questions, I'm happy to take those at this time.
12	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Kevin. Thank
13	you for your detailed report. Commissioners, any
14	discussion?

23	Commissioners. This is Kim Rogers. Mr. Smith was not
24	able to join today. I am the Vice Chair for the BAC.
25	The BAC met on January 21st via Zoom.

It was a short meeting. We approved our minutes. Mr. Hanson and Tyler Vance let us know in reference to the last Commissioner's meeting everything went well.

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Mr. Vance let the members know in reference to his draft for the gift card ideas we have been working alongside Mr. Vance to improve the language so that it can go through with the Kickapoo's approval of our language.

Also, Ms. Green discussed temporaries on demand. This is something that staff has been working with Ms. Green and her work group on. And this will really help the industry to be able to have extra sessions when we are busy. Tom Hanson let us know that it is in the works and that should come quickly this year.

We discussed that there was no BAC positions open at this time. Mr. Hanson let us know in reference to the illegal gambling that has been taking place on Facebook, how we can assist in the industry to report that to staff, so hopefully something can be done to get that stopped.

Mr. Hanson also presented the numbers for the Bingo industry that took place during COVID-19. As expected, they are down pretty bad.

We had one public member speak, Mr.

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Vernon. He was just there to back that up and let us 1 2 know that they started with nine halls prior to the 3 pandemic. They are down to eight now. They had to shut one down. 4 5 Our next BAC meeting will be held via 6 Zoom on March 25th at 10:00 a.m. Everything went 7 wonderful. I would be happy to answer any questions if 8 you all have some. 9 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank you for your 10 report. Commissioners, are there any discussion? 11 (No responses) 12 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Before we move 13 on, Commissioner Fields, I was going to see if you'd 14 like to make any comments here. 1.5 COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Actually, I was 16 not able to sit in on the BAC meeting, so I really 17 don't have any comments. 18 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Just as the 19 Bingo Commissioner, I want to make sure that you are 20 able to just -- anything at all. So -- okay. Sounds 21 good. 22 AGENDA ITEM NO. IV 23 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: The next item is a 24 report on amendments to the scratch ticket contracts.

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Mike Fernandez, this is your item.

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MR. Fernandez: Good morning, Mr. 1 2 Chairman, Commissioners. For the record, my name is Mike Fernandez and I'm the Director of Administration. 3 Item number 4 in your notebook is a 4 briefing item to advise the Commission of staff's 5 6 intent to amend our three scratch ticket printing 7 contracts with Scientific Games International, IGT 8 Global Solutions, and Pollard Banknote. 9 The purpose of these amendments is to 10 modify the respective price sheets to include 11 additional add-on features, product quantities, and 12 ticket sizes. Commissioners have independently 1.3 confirmed they do not have any financial interest in 14 any of the noted vendors. If you have any questions --1.5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, 16 any discussion? 17 MR. FERNANDEZ: -- Commissioners, I 18 would be happy to answer any. 19 AGENDA ITEM NO. V 20 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Mike, good job. 21 The next item is still yours. A report on amendments 22 to lottery operator contracts. 23 MR. FERNANDEZ: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 24 Again, for the record, my name is Mike Fernandez. I'm 25 the Director of Administration.

Item 5 in your notebook is a briefing item and is to advise the Commission of staff's intent to amend our current Lottery Operations and Services Contract with IGT Global Solutions. The purpose of this amendment is to further clarify a certain contract to provisions based on current business practices and audit recommendations.

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Additionally, the Texas Lottery is seeking to take advantage of technology innovations that could potentially increase revenue to the State of Texas in consideration for agreeing to modify the frequency of retailer sales visits made by IGT lottery sales representatives and the number of required sales representatives.

Commissioners have each independently confirmed they do not have any financial interest in IGT Global Solutions Corporation. If you have any questions, Commissioners, I would be happy to answer them. That's all I have, Mr. Chairman.

MR. BIARD: And Commissioners -- CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay.

MR. BIARD: -- excuse me. This is Bob
Biard, General Counsel. If I may just interject
briefly, whenever the Commission takes up negotiation
of the Lottery operator contract, you have the

1	opportunity under the Government Code to discuss the
2	negotiation in Executive Session.
3	Mr. Fernandez can correct me, but it is
4	my understanding he does not recommend Executive
5	Session today. Is that correct, Mike?
6	MR. FERNANDEZ: That is correct, Bob.
7	Thank you.
8	MR. BIARD: Thank you very much.
9	Commissioners, I just wanted you to be aware you always
10	have that option. Thanks.
11	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Bob, thank you.
12	I and Mike as well. Commissioners, any discussion?
13	(No responses)
14	AGENDA ITEM NO. VI
15	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, number 6, next
16	item is adoption of lottery rule amendments. Kyle,
17	this is your item.
18	MR. WOLFE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and
19	Commissioners. For the record, I'm Kyle Wolfe,
20	Assistant General Counsel.
21	Item 6 in your notebooks contains a
22	proposal to adopt amendments to three rules. Rule
23	401.305, the Lotto Texas Draw Game Rule; Rule 401.312,
24	the Texas Two Step Draw Game Rule; and Rule 401.317,
25	the Powerball Draw Game Rule.

As presented at the last meeting, the purpose of these proposed amendments is to provide the Commission a greater flexibility to coordinate the draw dates and the times for its jackpot draw games to maximize potential revenue to the state. Specifically, the proposed amendments to Lotto Texas Draw Game Rule and the Texas Two Step Draw Game Rule provide the drawings for those games will occur on the days and times specified by the Commission's Executive Director.

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And, likewise, the amendment for the Powerball Draw Game Rule provides that Powerball drawings will occur on the day specified by the Multi-State Lottery Association Powerball Group and announced by the Commission's Executive Director.

We did receive two written comments on the proposed amendments. The first commenter opposed an additional Powerball drawing per week, and the other commenter opposed the amendments without giving a specific reason. In response to those comments, staff does not recommend any changes to the amendments.

And to conclude, staff does recommend that the Commission adopt the proposed amendments. And if there are any questions, I'd be happy to answer them. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners,

16	AGENDA ITEM NO. VII
17	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item is a report
18	on lottery sales and revenue. We have Robert and
19	Kathy. This is your item.
20	MS. PYKA: Good morning, Commissioners.
21	My name is Kathy Pyka, Controller for the agency.
22	With me presenting this morning is the Commission's
23	Products Manager, Robert Tirloni.
24	Our presentation this morning will begin
25	with the data on slide 2.

MR. BIARD: Bill, if you could move that to slide two.

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MS. PYKA: Thank you. Comparative data through the week ending February 6, 2021 are presented at the bottom of the slide. Total Fiscal Year 2021 sales through this 23-week period are \$3,424,000,000, which is an increase of \$709,000,000 or 26 percent over the \$2,716,000,000 in sales for the same period last fiscal year.

Fiscal Year 2021 scratch ticket sales reflected on the second orange bar are \$6,683,000,000, a \$473-million increase over the sales figure for Fiscal Year 2020. With a growth rate of 21 percent over last fiscal year, the Commission has continued to report double-digit increases in scratch ticket sales over Fiscal Year 2020 sales.

Scratch ticket sales amount to 78.3 percent of total sales to this period, as compared to 81.4 percent last fiscal year.

Fiscal Year 2021 Draw sales reflected on the second blue bar are \$741.8-million, which is an increase of \$235.5-million over last fiscal year.

Commissioners, this is a 46 1/2 percent increase.

Since our last meeting 10 weeks ago, there have been numerous new sales records established

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First, during January, a new all-time record was set for total monthly sales with sales of \$861-million for the month. This broke the old record of \$670-million, which was set in October of 2018 when we had dueling multi-state jackpots of 1.6-billion and 750-million.

There was also a new record set for total weekly sales, which was set in January with sales of \$227.8-million for the week ending January 23rd.

This broke the former record amount of 215.3-million that was obtained in January of 2016 when we had a \$1.6-billion Powerball jackpot.

Finally, last week we set a new record for total weekly scratch ticket sales with a weekly amount of \$136.6-million. In fact, over the last month, we have now had four weeks of scratch ticket sales that have exceeded \$130-million.

Robert will now provide an overview of detailed sales as outlined on slide 3.

MR. TIRLONI: Thank you, Kathy. Good morning, Mr. Chairman, good morning, Commissioners.

For the record, Robert Tirloni, Products Manager for the Commission. So, in this next slide, we'll break down where these \$708-million gain in '21 compared to

'20 is coming from.

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If we move to the top of the slide, the white font, that's the Jackpot portion of the Draw Game portfolio and you'll see we have a \$208-million gain. The bulk of that is coming from our two multi-state games, Mega Millions and Powerball.

So, since we last met in December, Mega Millions rolled up to a \$1-billion jackpot for the drawing on January 22nd. That is the third largest jackpot in U.S. lottery history. And that was the second highest Mega Millions jackpot ever.

And Powerball was simultaneously rolling up to a large jackpot. It reached a jackpot of \$730-million for the drawing on January 20th. So, that Powerball jackpot was the 6th largest jackpot in U.S. lottery history and the 4th largest Powerball jackpot. So, those large jackpots obviously resulted in some very good sales for both teams, and you can see for Mega Millions and its add-on games, that is resulting in a \$114.5-million year-over-year gain. And for Powerball and Power Play, that's resulting in an almost \$70-million year-over-year gain. So, great results, obviously, from those very large jackpot runs.

Good news also for our Lotto Texas game. Lotto Texas and its add-on feature are up almost \$25-

million. You may recall that back in September, Lotto Texas rolled up to a \$47-million jackpot. So, that may seem small compared to 1-billion, or \$730-million, but that is really a significant jackpot amount for our instate game, so, that helped contribute to those positive results that we're seeing for Lotto.

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Moving down into the middle of the slide. The blue font are our daily games. Again, we're seeing very good growth. The daily games are up \$27-million, with the bulk of that gain coming from the Pick 3 and Fireball feature for Pick 3. That game is up over \$17-million, so, we're very pleased to see this growth across all of our daily games.

So, our draw games are up \$235 1/2-million thus far. And, as Kathy mentioned, we continue to have stellar scratch ticket sales this fiscal year. Our scratch ticket sales are totaling almost \$2.7-billion, and that is a \$473-million gain compared to last year.

Commissioners, before COVID I would provide you with some scratch ticket samples at our Commission meetings. And obviously, I've not been able to do that for the past 10 months, but I thought it might be nice to close out today by giving you all the opportunity to see some of the scratch games that are

actually driving these very strong sales. So, I'm going to ask if we could advance two slides. Thank you.

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So, I'm going to show you the top 10 selling games for the week that just ended this past Saturday, February 6th. So, our number one selling game is a \$50 game, \$5 Million Fortune. That game started on January 18th.

The next three games that you see are from our Loteria family. This is a very important family for us. It's a core offering, meaning all of these games are out at all times throughout the entire year. They're color pulsed, meaning we change the colors when we print them. You know, we make slight tweaks. But this family is a core offering for us. The \$50 is a new price point in the Loteria family, and that started back in October.

The 100X, The Cash game that you see to the far right is part of our new Multiplier family that started on January 4th. If we can advance to the next slide; 200X The Cash is a \$20 game that's from that same Multiplier family that started in January.

And then we have a couple of more core games. Our \$10 Cashword game is a top performer. It usually ends up in the top 10 or top 15 games every

fiscal year. That's, you know, delivers consistent sales for us week after week, year after year.

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And then you'll see our \$5 Loteria game. So, I talked about the first three Loteria games on the previous slide. Loteria, that family, is a game that we have very carefully grown over time. We started that as a \$3 price point, moved to 5, and gradually over time introduced the 10, the 20, and then as I mentioned most recently this past fall introduced the 50. And that's a great success story for us.

And then the last two in the top 10, another 50, our \$200 Million Ca\$h game.

And then a game that I'm quite happy and excited about is our brand new \$20 Crossword game. This game only started on February 1st and in its first week it's already made it into the top 10. That's exciting because our hope is to make this a core product offering that's available to our players at all times. So, it's good news that it has, as I said, seen such stellar results in its first week and it's already in the top 10.

So, these 10 games that I just showed you represent \$66-million in sales last week. So, I just thought it would be helpful for you to see these on screen, since you can't get physical samples at this

point in time. 1 And that concludes our sales 2 3 presentation, but Kathy or myself are available for any 4 questions that you may have. 5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Kathy and 6 Robert, thank you so much. Your presentation, your 7 insight, always super valuable and also grateful for 8 your showing us what the games are looking like and you 9 are correct that we are missing that ability to 10 physically touch and look at the tickets. But this is 11 a really good substitute for the variables that are now 12 in place. Commissioners, any discussion? 1.3 14 (No responses) 1.5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Hearing none, 16 good job again Kathy and Robert, on that item. 17 Agenda Item No. VIII 18 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Item number 8. Still 19 with Kathy. A report on transfers to the State and the 20 agency's budget. 21 MS. PYKA: Again, good morning, Mr. 22 Chairman and Commissioners. For the record, my name is 23 Kathy Pyka, Controller for the Lottery Commission. 24 Tab 8 does include information on the

agency's transfers to the State and the agency's budget

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status. While the report in your notebook reflects accrued revenue transfers and the allocations to the Foundation School Fund, as well as the Texas Veterans Commission and the allocation of unclaimed prizes for the four-month period ending December 31st, 2020, we have recently completed the January revenue transfer, so, I'd like to provide you an updated status on revenue transfers to the State.

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Our total accrued revenue transfers to the State now amount to \$706.1-million for the first five months of Fiscal Year 2021. Of the \$706.1-million transferred to the State, \$688.4-million was the amount of revenue transferred to the Foundation School Fund and 8.4-million was the amount transferred to the Texas Veterans Commission, with the remaining \$9.3-million transferred from unclaimed lottery prizes. This leaves us with a 26.9 percent, or \$147.6-million increase over revenue to the Foundation School Fund for the same period last fiscal year.

Commissioners, with the amazing sales that we had in January, our revenue transfer was just shy of \$200-million. To put that into perspective, the average revenue transfer for the first four months of the fiscal year transfers were \$124-million. This brings our total cumulative revenue to the Foundation

1	School Fund through January of this year at \$26.4-
2	billion.
3	Also included in your notebook is the
4	agency's Fiscal Year 2021 Method of Finance Summary for
5	the first quarter ending November 30th of 2020.
6	The Commission's Lottery Account budget
7	for Fiscal Year 2021 is just under \$253-million. Of
8	this amount, 77 percent was expended and encumbered
9	through the end of the first quarter.
10	Our Bingo budget, which is funded by
11	General Revenue, is \$2.2-million with 89 percent
12	expended and encumbered through the end of the first
13	quarter.
14	This concludes my presentation. I'd be
15	happy to answer any questions.
16	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Commissioners,
17	any questions?

23	Number nine. Next item, report on Legislative Session.
24	Nelda and Kathy, your item.
25	MS. TREVIÑO: Good morning,

Commissioners. For the record, I'm Nelda Treviño.

Director of Governmental Affairs.

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I'm going to provide a very brief report regarding some of the legislation that has been filed this session and Kathy will provide a report as it relates to Senate Bill 1, the General Appropriations Act and the agency's Legislative Appropriations Request.

As you know, the 87th Legislature convened its regular session on January the 12th. In your Commission meeting documents, we included a copy of the agency's Legislative Bill Tracking Report. Many of the bills the agency tracks and monitors covers a variety of subjects. These measures could relate to subjects regarding open meetings of governmental bodies, Open Records and the Public Information Act, state purchasing and contracting, and matters related to human resources and state employee benefits.

Today I want to highlight those bills that have been filed that are specifically related to the administration of the Lottery or the regulation of Charitable Bingo. These include House Bill 394 by Representative Joe Moody.

This bill relates to the Lottery

Commission's rules on lottery game drawings. This bill

authorizes the Commission to conduct game drawings on a Sunday.

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House Bill 817, also by Representative Joe Moody, relates to the operation of a Quick Draw lottery game. This bill allows the sale of a Quick Draw lottery game, commonly known in the lottery industry as a Keno game, at bars and restaurants.

HJR 35, by Richard Raymond. This joint resolution would amend the Constitution to dedicate lottery proceeds to fund public education and would prohibit any advertising that would promote the purchase of tickets for the purpose of supporting education.

As of today, there have been no bills filed related to the regulation of Charitable Bingo. However, based on communications with industry representatives, it is anticipated there will be legislation filed.

Lastly, Senate Bill 1 by Senator Jane
Nelson, the General Appropriations Act and commonly
known as the State Budget, includes the funding for the
Lottery Commission for the upcoming biennium.

The agency has provided requested information regarding the agency's budget request to both the Senate Finance Committee and to the House

Appropriations Committee.

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I will now turn it over to Kathy to provide a report on the budget recommendations contained in the House and Senate versions of the appropriations bills and on the agency's budget request. And I'll be glad to answer any questions at the conclusion of Kathy's remarks.

MS. PYKA: Thank you, Nelda.

Commissioners, similar to the last legislative session, the Legislative Budget Board introduced budget bills for the Senate and the House which reflect different amounts.

In summary, the Senate version of the bill includes a \$15.9-million reduction to the strategy for promoting Lottery games within the Lottery dedicated account, while the House version of the bill is fully funded at our baseline budget level.

The Bingo Program funded by General Revenue is fully funded at the baseline level in both bill versions. In preparation for budget hearings before Senate Finance and House Appropriations, the Legislative Budget Board requested the agency provide feedback on all unfunded items and those that the Commission would like to pursue as exceptional item requests.

Our Legislative Appropriations Request 1 2 remains unchanged with the Commission requesting one 3 exceptional item in the amount of \$4.4-million for full 4 restoration of the retailer bonus program. 5 Other items included in our request for 6 the Lottery Dedicated Account is a new rider to 7 appropriate funds to promote lottery games as a 8 percentage of lottery ticket sales with a not-to-exceed 9 amount of \$40-million in each year of the biennium. 10 We've also requested a new rider to provide unexpended 11 balance authority of capital budget for the 12 construction of 1801 Congress. 1.3 This concludes my presentation and Nelda 14 and I would both be happy to answer any questions. 1.5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Thank you both 16 Nelda and Kathy. Commissioners, any discussion? 17 (No responses) 18 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Thank you both 19 for all the work that you're doing. I know that there 20 is definitely -- we all know that there is a lot going 21 on with session as it is really in full swing, so thank 22 you both for your efforts. And we look forward to 23 continued progress.

In your materials is a summary of our internal audit activities for the period. From these materials I will discuss three items: the revised 2021 Annual Internal Audit Plan, the Charitable Bingo Operations Division Ledger Account Reconciliation Project, and the CAPPS Payroll Process Audit Report.

The first item is the Revised Fiscal
Year 2021 Annual Internal Audit Plan. This will
require your consideration for action. We have revised
the audit plan based upon the need to conduct the
Charitable Bingo Operations Division Ledger Account
Reconciliation Project. However, from the audit plan
we have completed five of the audits.

We intend to move six of the audits to Fiscal Year 2022 and then complete the reconciliation project. But if the hours that we anticipated for the reconciliation project are not as much as we anticipated, we will proceed with completing some of the audits that we were going to move to 2022.

That is our proposed Internal Audit Plan revision. And if you have any questions, I would be

1	happy to answer them. Otherwise, I'm requesting that
2	you approve the plan.
3	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Before we take
4	a vote, Commissioners, any discussion?

Ledger Account Reconciliation Project. We are looking 1 2 at 4,981 accounts. We began the project approximately 3 second week of January. And as of last night, we've completed 125 of those reviews. They're going to move 4 5 along quite quickly now that we have a process in 6 place. 7 The last item I had for you today is the 8 CAPPS Payroll Audit Report. And I'm happy to report that this audit resulted in the best practices for the 9 10 agency with effective internal controls.

> The agency implemented a new time and payroll system on July 13, 2020. And so we looked at the internal controls and the revised processes to make sure there were not any weaknesses.

> I have to tell you that an undertaking of this nature requires a lot of time and effort, and we would like to recognize staff for the diligence in making sure that the appropriate internal controls were in place.

That's the end of my reports for today. If you have any questions, I'll be happy to answer.

And I'd like to report that since my appointment, I have been meeting with Commissioner Fields, with Darlene, the Lottery Directors group and Bingo staff members to help me get a better grasp of what's going on in the division and how we can best move forward with it.

On Monday the audit group brought in a new employee, Mark Doehne. So, we welcome him. We're also very close to making a job offer in the Compliance Division. The accounting team is in the process of revising a job posting and we'll get that person in as soon as we can.

I have no other items for you this morning, but I want to thank you for your confidence in me. I want to thank all the staff, Commissioner

Fields, and everyone else who's helping me through this 1 2 transition. And I'm available for any questions. 3 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Alrighty. Tyler, 4 thank you again for stepping up. Your commitment to, not only Bingo, but to Lottery, is definitely noticed 5 6 and greatly appreciated. 7 For those who were not on the call last 8 week, a change was made, needed to be made, and we are 9 glad that Tyler has stepped in and moving Bingo 10 forward. Cindy, do you have any comments? 11 COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Yes. Again, I'd 12 just really like to thank Tyler for stepping up and 1.3 doing what he's doing. It's not an easy job, but he's 14 hit the ground running. So thank you, Tyler. 1.5 Thank you. MR. VANCE: 16 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Commissioners, any 17 further discussion on this item? 18 (No responses) CHAIRMAN RIVERA: And before we leave 19 20 the Bingo item, we are continuing to move forward on 21 the new hiring process, and so I understand that 22 communication will continue as we move forward. And so 23 as there are any questions or anything that needs to be 24 communicated, Cindy is more than happy to help

coordinate, answer questions. She is literally

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available at all hours and is incredibly hard working 1 2 and earnest in her Bingo efforts. So, Cindy, thank you 3 for also assisting with this important responsibility. COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Sure. And I think 4 the position was posted yesterday or possibly today. 5 6 MR. BIARD: Yes, Commissioner, this is 7 It has been posted and it is up on our Bob Biard. 8 website right now. Thank you. 9 COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Okay. 10 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Thank you, all. 11 AGENDA ITEM NO. XII 12 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item is our 1.3 esteemed Executive Director's report. Gary, this is 14 your item. 15 Good morning, Mr. Chairman MR. GRIEF: and Commissioners. I first wanted to just make sure 16 17 that you can hear me okay. 18 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Yes. Everyone --19 MR. GRIEF: Very good. Other than 20 what's in your notebooks this morning, I just wanted to 21 add a few supplementary comments regarding lottery 22 sales and revenue to the presentation that you heard 23 from Robert and Kathy this morning, with the particular 24 focus on what's just occurred in the month of January,

which, as you heard today, was the most successful

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month in the history of the Texas Lottery.

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Our scratch ticket sales have now risen to levels that we've never seen before. In fact, our top three all-time record weeks of scratch ticket sales all occurred in the month of January, with a new all-time record of \$133.5-million in sales occurring the week of January 9th. And, as you heard, we just topped that record in the first week of February.

We have a friendly ongoing rivalry with the Florida and the California Lotteries for the title of the Best Scratch Ticket Lottery Sales in the country, and I'm really proud to say that for the last four full weeks of sales, Texas has been averaging more than \$131-million a week, and that places us number one in the country over that period of time.

Commissioners, there are several reasons why the Texas Lottery is one of the top sellers of scratch tickets in the country and in the world. We do several things differently than other lotteries in this regard and the results speak for themselves.

We are the only U.S. Lottery that uses all three of the vendors capable of printing scratch tickets in a meaningful way. That is, we ask each of them to print roughly 1/3 of our scratch ticket products and then we ask them to compete every day for

our business with the very best products and the latest innovations that they can provide us.

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We also print more games at more varied price points and styles than any other lottery, all in an effort to constantly have something in the market that appeals to everyone.

We've also been the early adopter of higher price-point scratch ticket games, particularly at the \$20, \$30, and \$50 price points. Having recognized early on from our players a strong desire for those price points, both for convenience of purchase and better overall odds of winning, with the higher price points.

And, finally, Commissioners, we plan for this success. Our annual game plans are plotted out months in advance. Nothing's left to chance. Every individual game and launch date is carefully and strategically executed. And we build in all types of levers that we can pull throughout the year to modify that game plan as the market dictates to us.

To complement these strong scratch tickets that we've got in our portfolio, our draw sales have also been extraordinary as of late. As you've heard from Kathy and Robert, after many months of low jackpots and weak sales, both the Mega Millions and

Powerball jackpots rolled and rolled and rolled until Powerball reached \$731-million and Mega Millions reached \$1-billion.

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So, where we typically do around \$21-million a week in draw sales when jackpots are at their starting and lower levels, the last three weeks of the big rolls in January, we did \$57-million, \$88-million, and finally \$98-million. That last week being almost five times our normal weekly sales for all draw games.

And, not to be lost in the discussion, I hope you picked up today in the presentation, we continue to see very strong sales growth for the Pick 3 and Daily 4 games.

So these last few weeks, Commissioners, have now positioned us more than \$700-million ahead of last year's record-setting sales pace. But we are far from satisfied.

I've set an internal goal of breaking last year's all-time sales record by \$1-billion by the time the fiscal year ends in August. Meaning, we need to reach total sales of \$7.7-billion by year's end to reach that goal. It's very ambitious, but it's one that our entire team has embraced and is focused on.

I've asked every staff member to ask themselves what they can do each day to help us reach

that goal and continue to generate critical revenue for 1 2 both education and veterans services in our state. 3 Mr. Chairman, that concludes my report, 4 and I would be happy to answer any questions. 5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Gary, thank you for 6 your detailed report. Clearly, we are moving in a 7 positive direction. Your leadership, the leadership of 8 our executive team, going down all the way to the 9 newest hire that has come on board and everybody in 10 between regardless of how many years you've been here, 11 you're all part of the success that we have achieved as 12 an organization with, again, just challenges daily. 1.3 Everyday it seems like there's something 14 that comes up that has to be overcome. But as those 1.5 challenges arise, they are definitely met and serve as 16 building blocks to move forward with. And so, these 17 are ambitious goals that are set, but the entire body 18 of Commissioners are in full support of the direction 19 of the Lottery. 20 And, Gary, your leadership just remains 21 constant and strong. And we are very grateful and just 22 happy that you're at the helm. So, thank you. 23 Commissioners, any comments or

enforcement matters; tabs A through E. In these cases Commission staff found the licensee violated a statute or rule. In many of our cases either the respondent fails to appear at a hearing and it proceeds by default, or the staff and the respondent reach a settlement in the form of an agreed order.

Occasionally, we have litigated cases, and we do have one of those today.

Tab A is a non-sufficient fund Lottery retailer license revocation. This case was presented at the State Office of Administrative Hearings for revocation of the retailer's license because the licensee failed to have sufficient funds in their bank account to cover electronic fund transfers to the Commission's account. The licensee failed to appear at the hearing, and the judge remanded the case to the Commission to handle as a default matter.

1	Tab B is a Lottery a litigated owner
2	purchase case. And the judge here recommended a 90-day
3	suspension, which we recommend that you approve.
4	Tabs C, D, and E are all Bingo Agreed
5	Orders involving charity conductor units and their
6	lessors. The materials for these cases are all in your
7	notebooks.
8	That concludes my presentation. You may
9	take up the enforcement orders in a single vote, if you
10	like. And, of course, I'll be happy to answer any
11	questions. Thanks.
12	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Bob, thank you.
