MR. SMITH: Okay. 12 MS. GREEN: Trace, I have a question. 13 MR. SMITH: Yeah, Melodye. 14 MS. GREEN: Hi, Trace -- Hi, Tyler. Ι 15 16 remember the last one we were talking about the temporaries on demand, and I believe Alice said she was 17 18 working on a form. Tyler, has that form been -- is that available to us now? 19 It's not quite. So the forms 2.0 MR. VANCE: They're completed, and we're testing it have been done. 21 through BOSS and through BSP. Sounds like they've got 2.2 most of the kinks worked out, but they're still having 23 trouble linking the two programs to make sure that 24 they're both accurately keeping track of how many 25

temporaries have been requested and used.

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But my folks tell me that they think 2 3 it's -- we're very close. We were originally thinking maybe the end of this week but then ran into some 4 issues. So I don't know exactly when, but we're getting 5 very close to having it finished. And once it's good to 6 go -- I just don't want to put it out and then have a 7 bunch of problems further down the road. So I want it to be nice and tight and finished before we put it out, 9 and then it'll be ready. 10

And the way it's going to work is there's Form 17 and 18. And you will submit 17 to request the temporaries, and then 18 you'll be required to send us after you use it and then that way we can keep track of it. But once you submit the request, we're going to issue you a blank license without a date, without a time, and then it's your responsibility to notify us after you've used it.

MS. GREEN: That's a lot of work, and I do appreciate you spearheading this and pushing this through. Thank you very much.

MR. VANCE: Sure thing. Yeah, and I'll reach out to BAC and the lawyers and everyone once we've got it going so you guys can start using it right away.

MS. GREEN: Thank you.

1 MR. SMITH: All right. Good deal. And this -- so this would probably be more 2 3 directed to the staff than anything. I had a manufacturer reach out to me in the past couple of 4 weeks, and there was some concerns that they had about 5 the approval process on software changes. Basically, 6 what they had described to me was that the way the 7 process is working like in real life for them -- is they submit a software change to GLI and GLI approves it or 9 does whatever they do and then it goes to Lottery and 10 then Lottery has to redo the same testing. And then 11 after that, they can't actually put it into a test 12 market until everything is approved. 13 And I know this is kind of a quick 14 question, I guess. But, Tyler, could you -- do you 15 know -- are you familiar enough with that process to 16 kind of give us an idea of how that process is going or 17 18 anything like that? 19 MR. VANCE: No, not really. Let me -- I'm looking at the rule approval of card-minding systems so 2.0 21 you can --I think --2.2 MR. SMITH: MR. VANCE: -- I meant that -- is it that 23 we're talking about the software for card-minders? 24 And I think 25 MR. SMITH: Yes, sir.

they're -- well, I don't want to use the word "issue,"
but I think their concern is the time frame that it's
taking them just to make a software change. And they
were reporting somewhere in the neighborhood of six to
nine months to be able to get just the software change
done.

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MR. VANCE: Oh, wow. So our rule says the Commission shall either approve or disapprove the submission based on the test results within 30 days of receipt of the test results, and you can -- or they can, rather -- they can utilize an independent testing facility if there's -- and the labs can run the tests based on our compliance standards. And then once we get those test results, we're required to approve or deny it within 30 days. There was an option for the agency to do testing, but I don't think we do that or haven't done it in quite a while.

But let me see. I see Vivian has raised her hand it looks like, or maybe not. I don't -- yeah, if there's anybody -- yeah, there we go. Vivian's raised her hand. So, Bill, if you could let Vivian speak up. Sounds like she knows more about it than I do.

MS. COHN: Can you hear me?

MR. SMITH: Yes.

MS. COHN: Okay. No, the answer is: We
do not retest. Once you submit the lab report, we will
review the lab report. We do not retest. The retesting
process was established in the past. It is before I got
into this agency. It's been a year and a half.

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And once we get the report, we actually just review to make sure that it's complying with whatever the TAC rule or the BEA rule. That's all we review. Then we will go through the approval process and get the Director to review. And, of course, sometimes we will request a manufacturer to demonstrate what is being changed.

MR. SMITH: Sure. And do you --

MS. COHN: If you have any questions, feel free to reach out to us. I'll be happy to answer your questions.

MR. SMITH: Okay. So if --

MS. COHN: Okay.

MR. SMITH: -- I may, like when they put something in -- let's say they use GLI, for instance. They use them, and they put in a software change. When it comes out of GLI, do they have to wait until it's fully approved to be able to test it, or are they allowed to put it in a beta hall to test it before it comes back out and is approved?

   people in the industry were pretty shocked when they saw
23
   the Keno bill come out that was, I guess -- what's the
24
   word I'm looking for? -- I guess, approved or maybe even
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sanctioned by the Texas Lottery Commission. In most of the industry's mind that I've talked to, Keno is a lot like bingo, and I think most people see that as a direct competition to bingo.

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It was very disappointing to see that come out and not have a heads-up that that was being worked on prior to the session or at least during the session. That was pretty disappointing. I don't know if anybody wants to add in on that. I wish that the Commission had reached out to the bingo folks and talked to us a little bit about that.

But is there any movement or any direction on that? Does anybody from the staff know about that bill or want to chime in on that?

MR. VANCE: I'm going to defer to GA on this, if either -- if Fritz or Nelda is available. I haven't been following that bill. I'm following the two bingo bills, but I'm not following the bingo bill.

And as far as I know, I mean, the agency doesn't take a position on any bill, either positively or negatively. We're not legally allowed to. Whatever the bill is, we just -- we make comments on how it may affect the agency, but we're not allowed to advocate either way for any bill.

I don't understand how Boyd Gaming, an out-of-state casino, can 19 lobby against our bill and get it killed, but that's 2.0 what happened last session. I mean, with them being 21 able to do that and now casinos wanting to come into 2.2 Texas, Conservative Texans is of the opinion of why do 23 we want to invite the devil into our house? 24 25 MR. SMITH: Gotcha.

Mitch Fuller from the VFW testified in favor 12 of it, and I believe Rob Kohler testified as a neutral. 13 And then I was asked a question about the 14 status of the prize fee situation with regards to 15 payments to local governments. But other than that, it 16 seemed like a very smooth meeting. There weren't a 17 18 whole lot of questions. We didn't face any major 19 issues. But I see -- Will -- Tom Stewart's hands 2.0 up. So, Bill, if you can let Tom speak. 21 2.2 MR. SMITH: Absolutely. Go ahead, Tom. 23 MR. STEWART: Can you hear me? 24 25 MR. SMITH: Yes, sir.

If not, let's move 5 on to No. 9, old business. 6 Electronic gift cards, I believe that we 7 had some issues on -- from the Native American groups on the electronic gift cards, and we may have sorted all 9 that out in the last meeting that I wasn't at. Is there 10 any movement or any issues that anybody wants to talk 11 about that? 12 This is Tyler Vance. 13 MR. VANCE: status of this is, is I provided a draft rule that 14 modifies the original that I think will relieve the 15 concerns of the Kickapoo, but the BAC hasn't taken any 16 formal action on it. So we need you guys to go ahead 17 18 and approve the rule as drafted, and then Governmental Affairs will reach out to the Kickapoo. And we want to 19 run it by them before we publish it so that we don't go 2.0 through all this effort and then they're not happy with 21 it still. 2.2 So I think this rule needs to go through a 23 little bit of a different process, but at this point 24 25 we're just waiting for the BAC to say go ahead and go

forward with the rule as drafted. And I had emailed
that out to you guys I think on Monday, and I'm happy to
read it, too, if everyone would like.

MR. SMITH: Yeah, if you could just -- and if you don't mind, too, Tyler, if you could give everybody some backstory on this as well.

And I can't remember for the life of me:

8 Do the -- do Kickapoos, they don't have a bingo license

9 in Texas. Right?

MR. VANCE: They do not. They're within their own jurisdiction. They have a federal gaming license, and the state doesn't really have any authority over them.

MR. VANCE: Their objection to the rule is they were concerned that a digital gift card could be used basically at your table. So you could take a card-minder and you could just load credits on a card and it would kind of drift into, you know, almost like an 8-liner-type situation, where a player wins credits and buys more games with those credits and does that all on their own.

And so the rule was modified to make it clear that the gift card cannot be applied to an electronic device directly. Like, you can't plug it

into your card-minder. But the gift card has to -- the use of a gift card has to involve a point-of-sale 3 system, an organization employee, so that the player can't just sit there and win and reload and win and 4 reload; that they use the card just like a gift card, 5 just like a paper gift card. It just happens to be on a 6 plastic card instead. 7 MR. SMITH: Okay. I don't -- I'm kind of 8 a commonsense guy. I don't pretend to be the 9 computer-savvy person. But some things that stick out 10 to me, and I think I've voiced this before: If the 11 industry is trying to do something to help the industry 12 and they're not a part of the industry -- I'm sure 13 they're great people and I've never dealt with them or 14 met with them and I'm sure they've got a reason for 15 their position and I do respect that -- but if it 16 doesn't benefit them or hurt them, hey, let's help our 17 18 own industry. That's just my two cents' worth. But is there -- anybody have a position on 19 that, or is anybody ready to vote on that? 2.0 This is Will Martin. 21 MR. MARTIN: ready to vote on it. MR. SMITH: I believe what's happened on that, once this got started, I know Steve is doing some work -- actually, quite a bit of work for some groups in the bingo industry. I feel like that probably just got set aside and hasn't happened yet.

Tyler, do you know? Have y'all done anything actively about the Facebook stuff?

MR. VANCE: When we receive complaints, we pass it on. We have a direct contact at Facebook. And since I've been the Acting Director, I think we've got two or three complaints, and I sent them on to Facebook and they removed the pages at issue. So that's still working, from our perspective. We encourage you guys to through the process yourselves, as we sent out the method of complaining to Facebook. But, of course, feel free to forward that on to us, too, and we'll pass it along.

But as far as the -- the Fenoglio subcommittee, I really don't have anything to do with that. So...

MR. SMITH: Right. Right. I know you can't talk about an active case specifically, but once they do find someone that's hosting one of those pages,

1 like say they're buying pull-tabs out of Louisiana and they're selling them in Texas, are y'all taking an 2. active, aggressive approach to prosecution on that? 3 Or, I mean, what --4 MR. VANCE: What we do, it depends on the 5 complaint. So many times, a complaint comes in and it's 6 just got the page, and so we just forward the page on. 7 But sometimes it comes in and it's got the page and it's got links to the people who are running the page, and in 9 those cases, we check them against the Registry to see 10 if they have licenses. But a lot of times you can use 11 whatever name you want on Facebook, and so we get people 12 that have names that are not -- they're not Paul Smith. 13 So it's not something that you would expect to find in 14 the Registry. 15 MR. SMITH: Sure. 16 So it makes it very difficult 17 MR. VANCE: 18 from our end, but we do try. We run their names through. And if we find somebody on the Registry, then, 19 yeah, we'll definitely pursue it. 2.0 21 MR. SMITH: So if they're not on the Registry but you get a serial number -- and I'm just --2.2 I'm not talking specifically here. I'm just saying in 23 general. So if you see a serial number from a pull-tab 24

but nobody's on the Registry, are y'all still actively

25

1 trying to find out where those tabs came from and who 2. purchased them? MR. VANCE: Yeah, sure we would do that. 3 But typically when a complaint comes in, we just get 4 like a screenshot of the group. We're not -- people 5 aren't sending us hard-core video evidence with 6 close-ups of the pull-tabs that are being used in 7 general. But, yeah, if -- I mean, if we receive that information, if we see Texas pull-tabs and we have 9 enough evidence to act on it, then we certainly will. 10 But in general, the complaints we get are 11 frankly more of a personal nature: "These people were 12 mean to me, " "These people didn't pay me, " things like 13 that are the kind of complaints we get from the public. 14 So there's just not a whole lot of information for us to 15 act on in there other than there's clearly illegal 16 bingo. And so we forward it to Facebook, and they shut 17 18 it down. 19 MR. SMITH: All righty. MS. GREEN: This -- this is Melodye. 2.0 Tyler, have you -- have you been receiving 21 2.2 many complaints, or has it slowed down? No. I think it's slowed down. MR. VANCE: 23 I'm not sure exactly how many we were receiving when Tom 24 was in charge, but since I've been here in the last 25

month or so, I think we've gotten three, and they were all resolved pretty quickly.

And like I said, I haven't seen any from industry groups. It's more -- it's players, you know, people who I would assume were participating in the online game and didn't like how it turned out. But nonetheless, we still forward those to Facebook.
