You guys are free to recommend the same 11 thing or something different. 12 13 MR. SMITH: Absolutely. And, Tyler, I know you've done a lot of work on this and the staff 14 has, too. So, we really appreciate the back and forth 15 16 that you do. We know that's not easy being in the middle of two different groups. So, we definitely 17 18 appreciate you. 19 Any public comment? I'm sure we'll have several, so --20 21 MR. MARTIN: I want to have you explain that part that they want to stick in there. Run that by 22 me again. 23 24 MR. VANCE: So, the last time we submitted

I just kind of want to reiterate what Tyler said. This was a proposed rulemaking I believe back in August, and the Kickapoo did submit comment, 11th hour comment, which jammed up the staff, which had caused the staff to have to withdraw the rule. And the Bingo Advisory Committee I think understood that, and so we fast forward. The staff was trying to address the comments that were provided by the Kickapoo.

2.0

And I reread the comment that they submitted back on September 20th, and a lot of it is: The proposed rule runs the risk of opening the door for devices to allow credits to be accumulated and replayed like a slot machine. It's running the risk, imposing restrictions that could -- does not impose restrictions that, in fact, might allow accumulating credits and replaying like a slot machine. They had a concern regarding the use of the term otherwise.

So, the staff took a huge effort in trying to address the Kickapoo's comments and presented to the Bingo Advisory Committee at its March 25th committee meeting proposed language, and at that time the Bingo Advisory Committee approved that language. And that's what caused the staff to send that to the Kickapoo, and

what they did was to make it very clear in the language that the electronic bingo gift certificate could not be used to award any kind of forms of credits on an electronic device. It could be used on a point of sale but not on an electronic device, which I think we all thought was very, very reasonable in terms of trying to address the Kickapoo's 11th hour comment, which jammed up the staff and the Commission on the process.

So, now the Kickapoo wants to add the phrase -- I'm going to just read the last sentence, and you-all have received that -- the licensed authorized organization may not issue or award a bingo gift certificate electronically. And this is what they want to insert, as a prize for bingo or, and then in the form of credits. So, the electronic gift certificate is just a different medium than paper. The paper gift certificate has been approved.

It is very clear in the draft language that the electronic gift certificate is not going to be used in any other form beyond how a paper gift certificate is used, and certainly, the staff is the regulator. And if there's somebody who is using this electronic gift certificate that's not in compliance with the rule, the staff can take action. And frankly, the staff monitors the point of sale system like on the

1 customer accounts, and so they know whether there's 2 going to be a problem or not.

So, on behalf of the VFW we are requesting 3 4 that the Bingo Advisory Committee oppose the proposed language by the Kickapoo Traditional Tribe of Texas and 5 continue to support the language the staff drafted and 7 that the Committee approved at its March 25th committee meeting. I don't think that we ought to be operating in 8 terms of speculative running the risk of something 10 that's going to happen, and I use this as an analogy. You know, well, we're all sitting in this room. 11 know, we're running the risk that there's a tornado 12 that's going to come through this room, but how likely 13 is that. It's not. 14

So, I think good government and good rulemaking is you stick with what you have, and you don't speculate beyond the context of the rule. And you address violators, and I'll be happy to answer any questions.

Two new things: I'm sometimes 17 accused of being too blunt, but I'm never accused of people not knowing where I stand and the people on whose 18 19 behalf I speak stand. 20 I think it's very important for us to differentiate between the Kickapoo nation and the 21 representatives of the Kickapoo nation. I've dealt with 22 representatives of the Kickapoo nation for a decade now. 23 2.4 They are overreaching. They are monopolists, and they're acting in the way monopolists act. 25

frequently, a monopoly mentality influences someone's communication and actions in a way that makes no damn sense at all. Is that clear?

MR. SMITH: Crystal.

MR. BRESNEN: Turning to matters of the greater importance to the agency, a few years ago in response to the North Carolina Dental Board case, that was an antitrust case brought against the North Carolina Dental Board. And it provided that when an agency is dominated by market participants, it's subject to the antitrust laws of Sherman Federal Antitrust Laws, unless there's state supervision above that agency of the agency's rulemaking, the object being to have a guard against the use of an agency to engage in any competitive conduct.

This agency does not fit that description. That was dentists who dominated the dental board trying to keep people from doing things in the mouth that had nothing to do with practicing dentistry, but the Legislature, nonetheless, enacted a statute. It's in Chapter 57 of the Occupations Code, and it requires state agencies to present to the Governor's office proposed rules with the expressed purpose of defeating anticompetitive conduct carried out by the State of Texas. So, it would be a violation, in my opinion, of

state policy for the Kickapoos to prevail, their representatives to prevail in trying to put this into a statute that the agency has full authority to adopt.

2.0

Monopolists do what monopolists do, and that's to try to stifle competition, real or imagined. There's a thousand charities that are something like 17 million customer visits. There's \$750 million in gross revenue in charitable bingo. There is nothing about this rule that would impede the monopolist representatives of the Kickapoos in the Kickapoo's operation, which in this state is a monopoly.

Just to make sure that there's a complete record here, I'd like to read. Normally, I wouldn't read to people in giving testimony, but I think it's important. Section 57.105(a) of the Occupations Code requires an agency to submit to a division in the Governor's office for review the proposed rule before it's adopted or implemented.

what the agency is to review on the basis of, and this is in Section 57.106(a) of the Occupations Code: The division shall conduct a thorough, independent review of each proposed rule submitted under the other section to determine if, one, the effect of the proposed rule on market competition is consistent with state policy as

established by the applicable state agency's governing
statute. Nobody disputes, to my knowledge, even the
Kickapoos, the representatives of the Kickapoos, that
the agency has the authority to adopt this rule.

And we're very appreciative to the staff for taking on the task and recognizing the importance of it and sticking with it.

Tyler, I really appreciate y'all, Bob, everybody that's worked on this.

The second thing that the Governor's division is to consider is whether the proposed rule promotes a clearly articulated and affirmatively expressed policy as established by the Legislature to displace competition with government action. There is no policy established by the Legislature that requires or even nudges or hints at this agency to displace competition by this rule. So, assuming arguendo, as the real lawyers say, the real lawyers, that this rule would somehow affect the operation of the Kickapoo nation in Eagle Pass, Texas along the Texas border, then this agency has not been asked, directed, or hinted to by the Legislature to the limit that competition by rule placed on charitable bingo.

I don't know how many members of the Kickapoo nation there are, but if you're familiar with

their history, they were living under a bridge in the 2 worst possible circumstances that human beings can live It makes the homeless situation in Austin, Texas 3 under. 4 look like child's play. And because they were able to engage in casino gambling and have an operation down 5 there, many people have been lifted out of poverty. 7 That is why it's extremely important that we distinguish between the Kickapoo nation and the overreaching, 8 monopolistic representatives of the Kickapoo nation who look for every opportunity to bill them, the lawyers in 10 Arizona, by the hour. 11 I think they're in Arizona, aren't they, 12 Mr. Fenoglio? 13 14 And their lobbyists here. And, frankly, I'm about sick of them sticking their nose in it where 15 16 they have no legitimate concern. Their concern is not a 17 moral concern on behalf of the people of Texas. not a legal concern expressed in any way by the 18 Legislature to limit competition in this field, assuming 19 there would be. 20 It is monopolists doing what monopolists 21 do, and that's to hold other people down. And if there 22 are any questions -- I'm kind of doubting it -- but if 23 there are any questions, I'd be happy to answer them. 24

The importance of pull-tabs or event tabs to all licensed bingo charities in the State of Texas cannot be understated. The money raised from sales accounts for 90 percent plus of all revenue in most halls of Texas. Consequently, our charities are dependent on these revenues.

The problem we are faced with today is there is a supply shortage that was caused by several factors that relate back to the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown. In very short and simple terms, we have reached a critical point with tab supply in the bingo industry. Manufacturers are currently working two shifts and are unable to keep up with current demand.

The background cause: From March of 2020 until May of 2020 bingo halls were shut down.

Manufacturers or printers of tabs shut down also around April of 2020 and did not open up until late in the year of 2020. When bingo halls did open up, sales of tabs skyrocketed by approximately 73 percent due to the stimulus checks sent out by the government and just pent-up demand.

So, for approximately seven months the manufacturers and distributors and charities were

1 selling off inventory without being able to replace it.

2 When states like New York and California opened back up,

it really made the shortage worse. Other matters, such

4 | as finding employees, has caused a problem with

5 | manufacturers being able to obtain raw materials used in

6 | their manufacturing process.

Even though manufacturers are running at 100 percent, there is no doubt that charities will reach a point in 2021 where they will not be able to obtain tabs, and this will be a crushing blow for charities, cities, counties, and the State of Texas, who all receive revenue from the sale of tabs. Also, on the negative side for charities is that the cost of tabs have increased from 10 to 18 percent.

The current supply situation: Right now, if you submit an order for tabs at the end of June, you will not receive them until the third or fourth week in January of 2022. Also, the manufacturers are selectively printing only certain tabs. This industry-wide condition will affect all halls but could mean certain closure for smaller halls, like the American Legion and VFW post. I do not have to tell you all the great things that revenue from charitable bingo does and will be lost forever, and thousands of jobs of bingo workers would be at risk.

There is a solution to this problem: 1 2 solution is electronic tabs, which are played on hand-held devices that we already use as card minding 3 4 devices while playing bingo. There are several states -- and I've been told that these states weren't 5 wrong -- that have enacted temporary rule changes to 6 7 help their charities survive this industry condition. They have changed the rules with the option of looking 8 at the situation in 12 to 14 months. 9 10 We were asking you to align with us for a temporary waiver and/or permission to utilize electronic 11 machines in place of physical paper pull-tabs until 12 manufacturers can once again keep up with this 13 unprecedented demand. If the Director of Bingo and/or 14 the Lottery Commission requires a live demonstration of 15 16 how this electronic equipment will work, that can most 17 certainly be arranged. It would show that nothing in the game has changed. It is about the same as doing 18 multiplication with a pencil and paper versus doing it 19 on a calculator. You get the same answer. 20 We hope that the Bingo Advisory Committee 21 would vote on this request of temporary consideration 22 here today, June 21st, 2021. Thank you. 23 2.4 MR. I'd also like to point out that the three states he mentioned did not legalize electronic pull-tabs with some temporary rule change. They were all enacted by legislation pre-COVID. So, I'm not aware of any state that's done a rule change to allow electronic pull-tabs.

Now, that said, there is some things that Texas could do rule-wise that might open the door for some product that's available. There's some preprinted pull-tab ticket dispensers that can display them on a screen that's available that would require minor rule changes but not pure electronic pull-tabs on a card minding device, in my opinion.

And I wanted to hear from Emile because I know there are states that 3 have a version of, what I call, a video confirmation of 4 pull-tabs. I know Virginia and New Hampshire have laws 5 for that. 6 7 And the AG opinion that I think you were referring to, GA-0591, issued by then Attorney General 8 9 Abbott, who is now in the Governor's office, indicated 10 that a video confirmation would be acceptable under current statute, the rules would have to be permitted. 11 Years ago the VFW, in connection with some 12 of their supporters, demonstrated here I believe a video 13 product that also dispensed the paper pull-tab with it, 14 and that is something that has, I think, some 15 16 attraction. The tab itself -- I mean, there's a 17 shortage of paper. There's a shortage of pull-tabs. 18 MR. BOURGOYNE: There's not a shortage of 19 paper. Okay? There's a shortage of manufacturers of 20 pull-tabs. 21 MR. FENOGLIO: I was --(Simultaneous discussion) 22 23 MR. BOURGOYNE: Well, actually, there's 24 not even a shortage. We're producing pre-COVID -- we're producing above pre-COVID levels. The demand is through 25

1 | the roof. That's the issue.

MR. FENOGLIO: Right. Well, I was told by one of the distributors that there is a shortage of paper for the pull-tab manufacturers, but maybe he was wrong about that.

But in any event, there's a shortage of product, and I think we all know that. And so with the product that I've seen, it can shrink the size of the tab, but you would still have, under current law under the definition of pull-tab under the Bingo Enabling Act, you would still have a paper -- or a product with perforated -- et cetera. And that's what I have seen, what the VFW, I believe it was, displayed here, and then I'm aware of at least one other manufacturer who is doing that in New Hampshire.

So, to Will's point, I don't think you can get to where I understand you would go, which is forgetting any paper product at all, just have video, and that's going to require a statutory change, at a minimum. But to confirm the video confirmation portion of it, I think it can occur, and we were close to that at one point. So, whether that solves the problem of product availability I think there would have to be a discussion with the manufacturers about this.

But, again, I've seen the product, and the

And so for 8 9 that purpose, in expanding the video confirmation for 10 all instant pull-tabs, the Commission has said that it has that authority. 11 To Mr. Martin's point and what he wants, 12 there is AG opinion on that. Of course, it always comes 13 down to the devil is in the details. You have to 14 actually look at the product, what the product is doing, 15 16 how is it functioning: To be able to determine does it go beyond not just the statutory authority, but also the 17 constitutional authority. And so I think if there's 18 something specific that people want to look at, that's 19 one thing, but just, in general, that video pull-tab, I 2.0 think the Attorney General has answered that in that 21 particular specific format. 22 I'd be happy to answer any questions. 23 24 MR. - 21 With regard to your comment, Ms. Uriegas, under Chapter 418 of the Government Code, the Governor 22 has wide authority in a declared disaster to basically 23 2.4 rewrite the law. In Texas, we can't rewrite the Constitution but can rewrite statutes. 25 So, to the

extent there was any statutory impediment, as long as that declaration is in effect, then the Governor could have some impact on that were he of a mind to do so.

On the other hand, my guess is, if we took a poll of everybody in this room, they would 100 percent agree that we just assume that the COVID disaster declaration go away and that we all remember that 2020 took a year and a half to get over with. So, I don't think we could rely on that change for very long, if the Governor were of a mind and if there is even a need in the statute to give some relief in that regard.

The second thing is, we know from our distributor friends, manufacturer friends and from people in the marketplace that something bad is going on in the marketplace. I don't know that we have done sufficient fact finding. Maybe we have. I might be the ignorant person in the room here, but I think if the Commission is going to be asked to do anything by way of giving relief, that we need a much more fact-based documented basis for the nature of the problem, the extent of the problem.

As Emile said, there's unprecedented demand, but manufacturers are producing even above pre-pandemic levels, if I understood correctly. But if there's unprecedented demand, that would be great for

bingo if that demand can be met. So, I would like to see the BAC recommend or seek out request from the staff, from people, participants in the bingo world to quantify, identify, get some people on record regarding the nature of the problem, any estimated timeframe that the problem would last, and that sort of thing. when we're going to the Commissioners, we're not just speaking anecdotally. I think it's very important for them to have a factual basis, particularly that might underline any future rulemaking, be beneficial to the agency to be able to justify what it's doing on that basis.

And also I think one of the things this conversation has shown is that it's kind of like your baby being the best looking baby on the planet. It's kind of in the eye of the beholder, and we keep talking about E-tabs. And we've already determined in this conversation that there's a wide variety of what people might consider to be E-tabs.

2.0

So, I think some concrete explanation about what's in and what's out would need to be on paper with the proper citation to AG opinions, board opinions, statutory provisions, et cetera. So, I think the BAC could request that from the industry, assistance from the staff, get everybody on the same page about that so

1 if something were to go to the Commissioners, then they
2 could rely on that and have a sound legal basis for
3 doing that.

2.4

In short, I think we have some work to be done before we endorse any particular solution and put the Commissioners in a position of saluting a flag that's not fully designed at this point in time. With regard to demonstrations or anything like that, I wouldn't have any opposition to that at all with the understanding -- and may I call upon our conversation earlier?

It probably ought to be a request from the agency or, at a minimum, the BAC, and it ought to be to multiple parties who might have something to show so we're in compliance with the Bingo Enabling Act making it clear nothing is being offered for sale in that context and that it's something that we have the umbrella shield of the agency for purposes of the Federal Jobs Act. I'm hoping, in summary, that my suggestions are to be very methodical and professional about what we do in order to give the Commission the soundest possible basis to respond to a request from the industry.

I'd be happy to answer any questions about that. Thanks.

MR. BOURGOYNE: First of all, our position is it's not a Texas problem. It's a problem in North America. It's a huge problem.

We can't put a number on it, but I can guarantee you, whatever you think it is, it's larger than that. It's a very significant problem. We've got problems in Alaska. We've got problems out east. We've got problems from all over. We get complaints from every single state just about.

We've done our part as far as going on Facebook Live and tracking serial numbers to certain distributors, and we've addressed those issues with those distributors as best we can. We're not the police of distributors. The regulatory agency that licensed them is the police, and we've filed complaints with each of those distributors' regulators.

It's now to a point where they're selling product to legitimate purchasers, clubs or charities, and they're putting the product on eBay or selling it outside the charity. Again, that's a regulator problem. They have to go to that distributor, find out who they sold it to, and then go to that club or licensed charity and make sure it went through the proper channels and they reported it as chartable income and not sold it on

1 eBay or something. 2 That's where the real problem is. can't police that. The regulators have to do their job. 3 4 I met with regulators in Kentucky last week at the North American Gaming Regulators 5 Association, and we had a charitable gaming roundtable 6 7 discussion. And I brought these issues up to them, and I pointed out to certain states -- Indiana and 8 New Jersey specifically -- where these problems are 10 coming from and told them what they needed to do to help solve the problems. 11 I don't know what else we can do at this 12 13 point, but again, a lot of people think we should just stop and quit selling to distributors. Well, we can't. 14 There's certain states that have -- all the rules. 15 Ιf 16 they're licensed, we have to sell to them. 17 MR. SMITH: Right. MR. BOURGOYNE: We can't just 18 indiscriminately guit selling to a distributor because 19 2.0 we think they're putting some product on eBay. We don't have that authority. That's not our job. That's the 21 regulators' job to do that. 22 23 And Facebook now -- I get complaints on 24 our NAGRA web page, and I sit in the -- pretty much that 25 thing that Tommy had done and put out about Facebook's

policies and all that stuff. Facebook is now responding 1 2 to those saying it's not against their policy. Facebook has turned a blind eye to this. 3 4 I don't know how they could stop it. mean, they could put their fact checkers on it like they 5 do on everything else and make it go away over night, 6 7 but I don't know how we get their attention, unless we get the attorney generals involved and U.S. attorneys 8 involved some kind of way. But I can tell you it's a 9 10 big problem. Emile, I heard you say 11 MR. SMITH: something that really caught my or peaked my interest. 12 You said that in other jurisdictions, charities and/or 13 operators will do the tabs on Facebook Live themselves 14 and report the money themselves? 15 16 MR. BOURGOYNE: Not reporting. They're 17 not reporting. They're not reporting. 18 MR. SMITH: So --It's outside the licensing 19 MR. BOURGOYNE: scheme of charitable gaming, if you will. 20 distributor sells to a licensed charity, but that person 21 who has authority to buy through that charity isn't 22 putting the product into bingo. He's taking it home and 23 2.4 doing it on Facebook and keeping the money himself.

it properly and you did report the income, is that 1 2 something that a charitable operator could do here in Texas? 3 4 MR. BOURGOYNE: Not without 5 authorization --(Simultaneous discussion) 6 7 MR. VANCE: You have to have a physical location. You can only play bingo at a physical 8 9 location that's indicated on your license. 10 MR. BOURGOYNE: There were several states that filed legislation this year to permit this type of 11 12 activity, specifically with raffles, but some even tried 13 to do it with bingo and pull-tabs. I don't think the legislation passed in any of those states, but they 14 tried to use COVID as an argument for that. 15 16 MR. SMITH: Okay. 17 MR. BOURGOYNE: I don't have a solution. I don't think there is one. We have been getting 18 complaints recently, the last five complaints I've got 19 2.0 off our NAGRA web page, where people who weren't being paid for their winners of pull-tabs on Facebook Live. 21 And hopefully, there will be more of that, and there 22 will be less players. 23 2.4 MR. So, here's an idea: It has been announced within the last two days that Governor Abbott is going to add something about regulation of social media to the special session that -- either the first one that begins July 8th or a subsequent one. That might be an excellent vehicle to include an amendment that would cauterize either of the people doing it.

I think I'm speaking over my own head here, but my guess is under federal law, they can't be on civilly-liable Facebook or any others for this conduct. But they also don't advertise cocaine on Facebook for a reason. So, I think what we probably ought to do is develop something appropriate.

Emile, if you would provide me with documentation of the instances in Florida and other places where people have been held criminally liable for doing that, a sufficient criminal penalty might dissuade people from engaging in misconduct via any social media. There are a half a dozen lobbyists registered. I looked at this earlier on the Ethics Commission's website.

Ironically, and I say ironically with the greatest amount of disdain that I could generate on a Wednesday in June, two of those lobbyists are the

lobbyists for the Kickapoo nation. 1 2 (Laughter) Surprise, surprise. 3 MR. SMITH: 4 MR. BRESNEN: So, working with our colleagues in the industry, we'll see if we can gin up 5 something and send it over to the Governor's office and 6 7 ask that it be included in the legislation to send a message out there to these people that are doing this. 8 9 MR. SMITH: I'm assuming it would help you 10 politically if we could come up with maybe -- working with Emile and with the rest of the distributors, if we 11 12 could come up with a possible number that is detrimental to the charities in Texas. 13 MR. BRESNEN: Well, that's -- in this 14 case, anecdotal information would be sufficient for the 15 16 purpose, whether we can get something passed or whether 17 the Governor would pick up the mantle or not. I don't know, but I do know that I'm highly motivated because of 18 the representation of Facebook in Texas to making an 19 2.0 issue out of it. I think I'll talk to those later today. 21 MR.
