It is 10:05, apologize 7 for my tardiness, the flight was a little delayed. We 8 will start with the pledge and we will go from there. 9 (Pledges recited) 10 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Again, you can 11 hear me, correct? Great. 12 AGENDA ITEM NO. II 1.3 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: The first item is the 14 2023 financial audit. Sergio, this is your item. 1.5 MR. REY: Good morning, Commissioners. 16 For the record, my name is Sergio Rey, Controller for 17 the Texas Lottery. With me this morning is Mr. Kevin 18 Sanford, the engagement partner for Weaver and Tidwell. Weaver and Tidwell performed the statutorily required 19 20 independent audit of our annual financial statements. 21 At this moment, I will turn it over to Kevin so he can 22 provide you with a briefing of our financial 23 statements. 24 Thank you, Sergio. MR. SANFORD: 25 morning, Mr. Chairman, Commissioners and Mr. Grief. As

Sergio mentioned, my name is Kevin Sanford. I'm a partner with the CPA firm Weaver and Tidwell. We conducted the financial statement audit for the Commission for the year ended August 31, 2023, and have some brief highlights to present to you as part of our audit.

There's really two main things that I wanted to cover in this report. The first is on pages four, five, and six of the Commission's financial statements, which is our opinion on these financial statements. And once again, this year our opinion is an unmodified or unqualified opinion. As CPA firms, that's the highest level of assurance we can provide to a set of financials and it states that in all material respects, the lottery's financial statements and footnotes are materially correct.

And then the last item, as the Commission, certainly an agency of the State of Texas, we are required under government auditing standards to test key internal controls over financial reporting, as well as key matters of compliance. And our report in conjunction with that testing, is on pages 77 and 78, the last item in the document. And happy to report that our testing uncovered no items to report, either in internal control over financial reporting, nor in

1	compliance in other matters. So, really in all
2	aspects, our report over the Commission's financial
3	statements, as well as its internal control and
4	compliance is a clean report.
5	So, I'm happy to go into any other
6	details, talk about anything else in the financial
7	statements or answer any questions that any of you
8	have.
9	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Commissioners, any
10	questions? Okay. Very good. No questions.
11	MR. SANFORD: Thank you.

After 17 that process is completed, the RFP can be issued. 18 If you have any questions or comments, I'd be 19 happy to answer them. 20 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, 21 any discussion? Okay. CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item, a report on Lottery sales and revenue. Sergio, again, and Will is

MR. REY: Good morning. Again for the record, my name is Sergio Rey, Controller for the Texas Lottery. Will Russ, Product Manager, and I will provide an update on sales through the week ending January 27, 2024.

At the 22nd week mark of fiscal year 2024, we had reached total sales of \$3.38-billion.

This is a decrease over 247-million or 6.8 percent from last year's \$3.63-billion for the same period. The draw sales had the largest decrease from last year.

This time draw sales decreased 17.5 percent or approximately \$157-million. This year's sales totals of \$740.5-million versus the \$898-million. This is, last year in January, the Mega Millions jackpot of \$1.35-billion attributed to a big spike that we did not see this year.

Scratch sales, noted here in the orange bars, encompass 78 percent of the sales through week 22. The \$2.6-billion total is about \$90-million less than last year. Now, even though the customer traffic impacts of the cold weather three weeks ago and the Mega Millions jackpot of last January had their impacts, scratch tickets remain relatively steady as approximately 3 percent decline over the last year.

That's the revenue perspective. Now, Will will discuss more on the game side.

MR. RUSS: Thank you, Sergio. Good morning, Mr. Chairman. Good morning, Commissioners.

For the record, I'm Will Russ, the Products Manager and will be giving a more detailed view of the sales that Sergio just reported on.

right corner, you can see the year-over-year decline of almost 248-million. The overwhelming majority of that is due to the two national draw games, Mega Millions and Powerball, and then also our scratch ticket sales. As I mentioned at the last meeting, we were up against a very tough year for jackpots, and at this point our biggest challenge has shifted to Mega Millions.

As Sergio mentioned, Mega Millions hit a \$1.35-billion jackpot last January, and that is the primary reason for the current deficit. It's worth mentioning that it is currently on a modest run and has a jackpot of 358-million. With some luck, it will continue to roll and will begin to close the gap.

For Powerball, you can see the deficit of about 36-million in white at the top of the slide. This is, however, encouraging because the deficit at the last meeting was about 52-million. On the first

day of the calendar year, Powerball hit an \$810-million jackpot, and that is when we made up some ground leading up to that roll. Draw game sales were positive year-over-year every week in December, and we know that this Powerball run was a contributing factor.

Similar to our last meeting, the instate draw game, Lotto Texas, is holding even and its Extra! feature remains positive as it has for a long time. The jackpot run that I mentioned last meeting was hit on December 30th, when it was at an impressive 34-million. Our toughest comp weeks are still ahead though, because as you all know, Lotto Texas hit 95-million last April.

Finally, Texas Two Step has also remained relatively flat. In the middle of the slide in blue are the daily games and there's better news to report here. Pick 3, Daily 4, Cash 5, and All or Nothing are all slightly up. We are particularly encouraged by Pick 3 sales as there has been declines over the years with players of that game moving to Daily 4.

In total, the draw games portion of the portfolio is down about 157-million, and there are still tough comp weeks ahead. All things considered, we're encouraged by the positive sales on all the daily

games, and are closely watching the current Mega Millions run to capitalize on sales from that roll.

As Sergio mentioned, scratch sales are down about 90-million or 3.31 percent. After our last meeting, scratch sales begin declining year-over-year through most of January. To end on a positive note though, last week was up 3.3 percent or about 4-million.

As I mentioned at the last meeting, we were going to add a third \$100 scratch ticket game to our portfolio in response to the decline that we saw in the beginning of the fiscal year. That game launched yesterday, and I've included a sample with your notebooks.

As a reminder, the prize structure for this game is different than the other \$100 games currently in market. The sales were very promising yesterday and I will report more on its progress at our April meeting.

With that, I'll turn it over to Lottery
Operations Director Robert Tirloni, who will give some
additional sales information.

MR. TIRLONI: Thanks, Will. Good morning, Mr. Chairman. Good morning, Commissioners.

I'm Robert Tirloni, Lottery Operations Director.

So, you heard about our scratch sales and our decline of 3 percent. Our 3 percent, or our \$90-million decline is from last fiscal, a fiscal year that saw record breaking scratch sales of \$6.729-billion. As we've discussed in previous meetings, while we've been experiencing scratch sales growth for many years, the surge in scratch ticket sales during the pandemic was actually quite amazing.

Fiscal year '20 saw growth of \$710-million over fiscal year '19, and fiscal year '21 saw growth of almost \$1.1-billion over fiscal year '20. We believe we have now entered and we're going through a reset period, so to speak; a return to more normal sales levels.

That being said, IGT has just shared some interesting information with us, and I think this helps put the whole sales picture into perspective.

The only two U.S. lotteries that typically outsell us in scratch ticket sales or come close to outselling us, are Florida and California. However, from the start of our fiscal year in September, we are ahead -- oh, and

through mid-January, so from September through
mid-January, we are ahead of both states, both
California and Florida. And therefore, we're leading
the United States in scratch ticket sales. We're not
sure how long our lead will last. We're not sure how
long it will hold out, but regardless, I think it is
important to note that while we are experiencing sales
declines, we are one of, if not the strongest seller of
scratch tickets in the U.S. We continue to monitor
sales closely, day by day in fact, as you heard Will
talk about, we're closely monitoring sales of the new
100 that started yesterday, and we are engaged with IGT
and all three of our scratch ticket vendors to continue
to produce and deliver strong scratch ticket games and
to come up with unique second-chance drawing prizes for
our players.
So, thanks for letting me jump in today

So, thanks for letting me jump in today and share this additional information that is fairly new, and I'm happy to, and I'm sure Sergio and Will, are happy to answer any questions that you might have.

MR. REY: Again, for the record, Sergio Rey, Controller. In this agenda item, I will provide a high level summary of the accrued revenues and transfers through December 31st, 2023. And this information is in your meeting notebooks.

Our accrued revenue transfers to the State total \$578.1-million for the first four months of fiscal year 2024. Of this amount, \$556.6-million were transferred to the Texas Foundation School Fund, \$7-million transferred to the Texas Veterans Commission, and the remaining \$14.6-million was transferred from unclaimed prizes.

Although this is less than the transfers at this time last year, our cumulative accrued transfers for Texas Education through December are \$32.4-billion and \$229-million for Texas Veterans. I'm going to pause here for any questions on the transfers.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Any questions? Okay.

MR. REY: Okay. The second part of this item is the budget summary of the first quarter of fiscal year 2024. That quarter ended on November 30th. At the beginning of the fall, the Office of the Controller presented to this body its fiscal year 2024

budget. Of the \$323.4-million appropriated by the Legislature to the Commission, \$320.89-million is for the lottery account budget. Through the first quarter, 67.3-percent of this budget has either been expended or encumbered. The Bingo Administration budget funded by general revenue funds totals \$2.5-million and 93.1 percent has either been expended or encumbered through the first quarter. These percentages are consistent with prior years and represent our continued commitment to be good stewards of State funds.

Now, every fall, the Office of the Controller is focused on year-end reporting. Earlier in this meeting we discussed the audited annual financial report, but other legislatively required reports were also submitted to our oversight agencies like the Comptroller's Office, Legislative Budget Board, State Auditor's Office, and of course, the Office of the Governor. The state annual financial report, the unaudited version, was submitted in late November, the fiscal year 2024 operating budget on December 1st, and the annual report of non-financial data in late December. These reports have been provided to you and are also available on the Texas Lottery website for public view.

The objective of this audit was to assess if the agency has adequate controls in place for the 37 areas of responsibility identified in the respective four SOC audit reports -- well, actually, it's three that we looked at. These were related to the gaming system and the scratch ticket services.

We rated internal controls as generally effective. We did identify two gaps related to how the respective UCC is written. Those two UCCs placed the burden on Texas Lottery Commission, when really, it's a vendor control that Lottery has no access to or authority over. And it's simply the way the control was written, it's nothing to be of concern about.

Our second completed audit is with the ticket warehouse operations and our audit focused on receiving those scratch tickets, distributing the scratch tickets to vendors, how tickets are returned, then the destruction of return tickets where the game's no longer in play, and taking physical inventory. In this area, we concluded that overall the design of the management controls are effective to ensure that

scratch tickets are secure, games are ready for 1 2 distribution to retailers according to the game release 3 schedule, and they're all generally effective. did note some best practices in the area of governance, 4 5 which is your policies and procedures and management of 6 operations. Also in vendor performance monitoring and 7 then communication and reporting of activities. 8 We're going to begin the legislative 9 change management audit, and we're viewing the scratch 10 ticket contracts. This concludes my report for today, 11 and I'll be happy to address any questions you might 12 have. 1.3 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, 14 any discussion? 1.5 COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Thanks, Darlene. 16 that, just rewrite that UCC, does that have to come as 17 a proposal from IGT on that? Whose job is it to fix 18 it? 19 MS. BROWN: It's IGT's responsibility to 20 rewrite that contract, and I did communicate with IGT. 21 It's not going to be an issue for them. 22 COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Okay. So, that's 23 an easy one? In most of these cases, either the Respondent failed to appear at the hearing and it proceeds by default, or the staff and the Respondent

reached a settlement in the form of an agreed order. We have both of these types of cases today, as well as one case that went to the State Office of Administrative Hearings.

Tabs A through G are all non-sufficient fund lottery retailer license revocations. Each case was presented at the State Office of Administrative Hearings for revocation of the retailer license because the licensee failed to have sufficient funds in their bank account to cover electronic fund transfers to the Commission's account. In each case, the licensee failed to appear at the hearing and the judge remanded the case to the Commission to handle as a default matter.

Tabs H through L are lottery agreed orders. I believe most of these, the majority of these, were cases involving purchases with a credit card, which are not allowed. I think there's one debit card case where the retailer charged a fee for a player to purchase a ticket with a debit card.

Tab M is a bingo worker agreed order, and Tab N is a default bingo accounting case that went to SOAH and the organization did not show up so it was also remanded to the Commission to handle as a default matter. And the recommendation in that matter is to

1	revoke the organization's license.
